

Commander McCartney Answers Questions about Safety

In these changing times, people are concerned about the threat of crime in their communities. No matter where you live, there are ways you can help protect your home and your neighborhood from crime. Cleveland Police First District Commander Thomas McCartney lives in West Park, and he knows first hand about crime and safety here. Here he shares information about perception versus reality, and provides useful advice about how to remain safe in our community.

Some people feel that crime is on the rise in West Park. What would you say to that?

I'm in touch with police chiefs in the nearby communities of Lakewood, Brookpark, Fairview Park, Parma, and so on. What's happening here is the same everywhere – a certain erosion of our culture has produced an uptick in crimes of opportunity, such as garage break-ins and stealing copper pipes.

Not long ago, people could leave their doors and windows unlocked on their houses and cars. Nobody would think of entering the house or car. For complex reasons, that's no longer true anywhere. As a result, the best practice is to keep your doors and windows locked on your house and your vehicle, not only for theft prevention, but as a measure against ransacking and for the safety of curious children. It's also a

good idea to keep valuables out of sight. At night, close your curtains. Nobody needs to see your television or computer. Secure basement windows, too. Glass block is ideal. Buy a high quality lock for your house.

In your car, put packages in the trunk, and never leave your purse or wallet in the car. Don't leave the keys in the car either. If you have a GPS, remove it from sight, too. Furthermore, clean your motor vehicle regularly. Clear out home address items such as mail, bank slips, and store receipts. Don't leave anything valuable in your car. Put it in the trunk only temporarily, and always keep things out of view and in your trunk when shopping.

What about reports of violent crimes?

Felonious assaults and homicides are rare here and have not increased recently. Basic statistics show that over 93% of felonious assault victims know their attacker. Over 90% of sexual assault victims know their attacker, and the assault takes place in a quasi-home setting. The boogie man in the bushes is rare.

What can women do to be safer?

Go in pairs for pre-dawn running. Don't leave yourself open to situational opportunity crimes. Be aware of your surroundings. Don't telegraph where you are going by clicking the key fob too early on the way to your car! If you see someone lurking by your car, use the alarm or panic button on your key fob. Have your keys ready when going to your car. Then get in, lock the door, and drive away.

Be sure to carry the essentials in a small purse. When women carry large purses, they tend to put them down or the purse gaps open to reveal their wallet. Take your time at the register when paying. Take an extra few seconds to secure your wallet into your purse before walking away. The next customer can wait.

What about break-ins?

Break-ins—yes. There has been a slight increase, but what I'm seeing are the stories of crime here getting blown out of proportion. The perception of crime is more damaging than the reality. In this close-knit community, people talk. That's generally good, but sometimes in the telling things get added. Social media posts about crime go unconfirmed and that sometimes adds to the negative perception. One garage gets broken into, but that becomes four.

When there is a theft, how often are the stolen items found?

Frequently! But, stolen items must have identifying marks or names on the article. So as not to devalue rare or expensive items, maintain a log of model and serial numbers on all your valuables when you get them: bikes, computers, and televisions. Take photographs of valuables. Keep the record with photos separate – NOT on your computer, which may also get stolen. Instead, put them in a cabinet or under a mattress. Thieves aren't looking for papers.

Are there any other records we should keep when it comes to crime prevention?

Keep a copy of fingerprints and snippets of hair for locating or identifying missing or lost family members, especially children.

Any other advice about kids?

Have a plan for picking up children at school, including who can and can't pick up the children. Establish a "safe pick-up plan" with the school. Know where your children are and set limits on where they can go and what time to be home. Teach them their phone number and address when they are old enough to learn that. Teach them when and how to call 911. Get to know all their friends. Pick a neighbor's house where your children can go if they need help while you are away. Point out other places they can go for help like the library, the YMCA, a certain church, or store.

What about the local businesses and organizations? Any advice for them?

Yes, they should use lights and alarms. Money should not be left on the premises overnight. Engage your customers in conversation. Say, "Hello, how are you?" Look people in the eyes. Security cameras are good. A great investment, but they are not always a deterrent if someone is desperate. However, they may help find the suspect after the fact. The Cleveland Police conduct business audits and offer advice on safety by contacting Community Policing at 216-623-5080.

We have a thriving business community and a vibrant nightlife. If you go out for the evening, especially young people should know the following: Order your own beverage and always keep it in your sight. If you come with a group, leave with that group. Our business district is a safe, thriving entertainment district.

Are safety audits offered for homeowners?

Yes. Call the community services unit at 216-623-5080. An officer will be able to identify things the homeowner may overlook, such as yard implements. Shovels left in the yard can become a weapon. If you have sliding windows, the officer may show you how to put a stick to block them from sliding when you are inside or away. Even replacing burnt out lights increases the safety of your home. A safety audit points out measures you can take that are unique to your home.

What can a neighborhood do to keep safe?

Know your neighbors. If their garage is broken into, they will tell you. Tell your neighbors when you are having service done such as floors refinished. Any time tradespeople will be at your house, let your neighbors know. "We are our neighbors' keeper." If you are away in the winter, arrange with a neighbor to ride up and down your driveway and walk around by your doors after a fresh snowfall. This makes your house look occupied. Use timer lights throughout the house and motion sensors outside.

Sometimes people are reluctant to bother the police. Should they be?

If you see something suspicious, call the police! Trust your gut. If you think it is suspicious, then it is! Know your neighbors' phone numbers, too. Have a phone tree to pass the word quickly if something happens and someone needs help. If someone does something suspicious, look at his or her shoes! Criminals often change their clothes but forget to change their shoes. Those Nikes with a tangerine stripe will stand out.

What's the best way to keep West Park safe?

It is best to be an actively engaged community. Utilize your police services. Get to know the police officers in your area. We hold a First District community meeting on the first Thursday of each month at 7 p.m. at St. Ignatius of Antioch, 10205 Lorain Avenue. In addition, if you really want to know more about what the police do and how policing works, sign up for the Citizen's Police Academy. Call the Bureau of Community Policing at 216-623-5080 to sign up. Consider forming a Block Club. Contact KCDC for assistance in setting one up. (See the article on page 23.)

Any final words?

This is a thriving and safe community. It's family friendly and offers fantastic amenities. Good schools, great shops, lively entertainment, and traditional worship mean a strong bond. We are each other's protectors. Stay involved. If you are not involved, get involved. Engage in the richness of our neighborhood. We have a lot to offer!

With assistance from the City of Cleveland Storefront Renovation Program, a comprehensive renovation is planned for the commercial property owned by Joe Coreno at 15716-18 Lorain Avenue. The building is home to the Lorain Triskett Bicycle Shop and the former home of Lorain Triskett Locksmiths, which recently relocated to 15802 Lorain Avenue. The renovation plan includes new signage, storefront upgrades, painting, and site improvements including stamped concrete pavers and landscaped planter beds. Depending on weather conditions, construction will start this fall or next spring.

The VIP Inn at 4107 Rocky River Drive is another Storefront Renovation Program project progressing toward construction. The proposed building design represents a dramatic change from the current appearance-new storefront windows across the facade, a new outdoor patio with a pergola and stamped concrete pavement, new signage, masonry updates, and building lighting. As with the above project, a fall or spring start date will be guided by weather conditions.

Ever since purchasing the building at 3600 West Park Road, Conor Boylan and his partner, Bridget Kelly, have been busy making plans to open 5 Points Coffee & Tea. Preliminary plans call for indoor seating, a walk-up sales window, and an outdoor patio. The poor condition of the building at the time of purchase will necessitate a complete rehab to the interior and a new roof. The exterior of the building will be renovated with design and financial assistance from Cleveland's Storefront Renovation Program. Staff of Kamm's Corners Development Corporation has worked closely with Conor and his partner on zoning and permitting issues as well as financing options for the project. To the delight of neighbors, the initial cleanup of the property has been completed. However, since the construction has not yet begun, there is no firm date set for the grand opening.

Working Class Brewery is moving closer to opening their micro-brewery and tap room next to the Red Lantern restaurant in the Kamms Shopping Plaza at 17448 Lorain Avenue. Construction on the interior space is slated to begin in November and the installation of the brewery equipment will take place over the winter. The brewery will likely open in the early spring of 2017. Stay tuned for more details.

Hatfield's Goode Grub Parks in Kamm's Corners ...by Ben Campbell

Most of us have heard of the legendary Hatfield-McCoy feud. If you had to choose a side, you may want to go with the Hatfields. Ken Hatfield, a descendant of the Hatfield family is working with his newlywed wife Jessica to open Hatfield's Goode Grub: The Pork N Bean at 16700 Lorain Avenue.

After spending the last year serving southern comfort food from his food truck, Hatfield's Good Grub had outgrown its small commissary kitchen and was looking to settle into a permanent restaurant location. Formerly Jasmine's Bakery, the built-out commercial kitchen with 3,000 square feet of space in Kamm's Corners caught Ken and Jessica's eyes as an opportunity to put down roots and keep growing. The food truck business will continue. For the restaurant, Hatfield's Goode Grub: The Pork N Bean concept was conceived.

The Pork refers to deliciously smoked pulled pork. Ken's restaurant background includes a four-year stint in the kitchen of an international hospital ship and studying under chefs at the House of Blues and Hard Rock Cafe. Combining his international and corporate experience with his upbringing in North Carolina, he has created a style of cuisine he refers to as "southern comfort fusion food." The restaurant menu will add daily specials such as meatloaf with mashed potatoes and hearty beef stew to the regular food truck offerings of BBQ pulled pork, BBQ chicken sandwiches, burgers, the Hillbilly Philly sandwich, blackened catfish tacos, and chili. Sides will include brown sugar-bacon mac and cheese, beans and rice, and hand cut fries. Restaurant service will be family style sit-down and carry-out.

The Bean refers to the coffee shop that will be run by Jessica. Customers will choose from a variety of brewing styles. Traditional drip coffee will be available. Cold brew coffee, a process of steeping the coffee for 12 hours that produces a coffee that is smoother and less acidic, will also be available. Siphon brewed coffee will also be offered, which is produced in a contraption that Jessica said resembles a still. Coffee drinkers can enjoy their brew at the coffee bar or with food from the restaurant menu.

Ken said their goal is to create family friendly environment that is rich in history and comfort that, well, feels like home. He said no alcohol will be served. A soft opening using their food truck was held with their Hillbilly Halloween event on October 31. A formal opening date will be set once the restaurant has passed all of the required inspections.

KCDC helped Hatfield's with the city permitting process, signage assistance from Cleveland's Storefront Renovation Program, and to negotiate a parking spot for the food truck at the U-Haul Moving and Storage across the street.

"We saw the attraction of having Hatfield's in the neighborhood," said KCDC executive director Steve Lorenz. "They're completely different from anything else in the neighborhood."

The expanded menu will include breakfast items such sausage and biscuits and pulled pork eggs benedict.

Tentative restaurant hours will be 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. weekdays, with a later closing time on Friday and Saturday nights. For more information, please go to hatfieldsgoodegrub.com or call 440-263-5221.

Patients with bile duct, liver, stomach, gall bladder, and pancreatic cancers now have access to advanced surgical options at Cleveland Clinic Fairview Hospital.

"Fairview Hospital offers some very advanced cancer operations with the advantage of a community environment close to home for our patients," says Cleveland Clinic general surgeon Toms Augustin, MD, MPH, who sees patients at Fairview Hospital. "By opting for surgical care at Fairview, patients living on the West Side are closer to their families and primary care doctors, reducing stress and ensuring continuity of care," he adds.

And, by investing in advanced surgical instrumentation and expanding its team of surgeon specialists with expertise in robotic-assisted and laparoscopic techniques, Fairview Hospital continues to be a recognized leader in minimally invasive surgery.

During a minimally invasive or laparoscopic procedure, the surgeon makes a small incision(s) and inserts a thin flexible tube which has a miniature video camera. Miniature surgical instruments may be attached to the tube, allowing the surgeon to operate while viewing the patient's organs on a computer monitor.

Robotic-assisted surgery is another option. With this technique, the surgeon operates from a console equipped with robotic equipment and highly magnified 3-D imaging, providing enhanced dexterity, and greater precision and maneuverability.

"Because minimally invasive surgical procedures cause less tissue, skin, and muscle damage, recovery time is reduced and the patient can return to normal activity more quickly," says Dr. Augustin.

In addition, Dr. Augustin offers minimally invasive ablation for liver tumors – a treatment that destroys tumors without needing removal of the liver.

"Patients are assessed for their eligibility for minimally invasive surgery on a case-by-case basis," he says. "We can perform many of the same procedures here at Fairview as Cleveland Clinic's main campus."

Dr. Augustin has been a practicing surgeon with Cleveland Clinic since 2012, and recently completed a fellowship program specializing in liver and pancreatic surgery. His specialties also include cancer of the biliary system, stomach, and gastrointestinal tumors.

The Montrose Pillars ...by Gary Swillk

For decades, two pillars of brick and stone stood like sentries at the entrance to Montrose Avenue on the east side of Warren Road. These were not simple upright posts but elegantly designed pieces of architecture. Each pillar consisted of a central column about twelve-feet high with two adjoining smaller shafts about eight-feet high, forming an open triangle with one side fronting on Warren and another on Montrose. Each pillar was topped with a carved stone cornice.

These twin pillars were so imposing it was natural to assume they once guarded the entrance to something wonderful, perhaps a palatial country estate. To the east of the pillars, Montrose Avenue meets Glencliffe Road. Both streets then diverge to form a vast oval-shaped plot of land now occupied by Riverside Elementary School. It is easy to envision a grand mansion once stood on the site.


"I went to Riverside School for the first half of kindergarten, and again for sixth grade," remembers Julieanne Appleson Phillips of Vandalia, Ohio. "I liked going to school from the Warren-Montrose side because the pillars formed such a majestic entrance. They seemed to be built of the same brick as the school. I always imagined I was approaching some millionaire's home."

"I rather liked those pillars," says Jeff Bowell of Cheyenne, Wyoming. "They added a touch of class to the school approach, although that's not a concept I really understood at the time."

"My grandparents lived on Montrose until the late 1990s," recounts Dan Holahan of Cleveland. "As a kid, I always thought those pillars were the last remaining part of some old castle which had been there."

The true origin of the Montrose pillars is less glamorous. In *From Rockport to West Park*, published in 2004, local historian Ralph Pfingsten reported the pillars were built in the early 1930s at the entrance to an exclusive community which was never completed. The pillars were as far as they got.

In 1936, Riverside Elementary School was built on the oval plot at 14601 Montrose Avenue, one of several Cleveland projects sponsored by the Public Works Administration as part of President Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal legislation. By 1940, Plain Dealer classified ads were promoting new homes being constructed on the Claridge subdivision surrounding the school.

Both Montrose pillars are gone today. In the 1970s a driver lost control and plowed his car into the southeast pillar. The pillar was badly damaged and removed shortly thereafter. The northeast pillar stood alone for another thirty years before being taken down in 2004 due to deterioration. For many, the intersection at Montrose Avenue and Warren Road will now always look barren.

Block Club Basics

A block club is a group of people who live on specific blocks and have organized to improve the quality of life in their community. Block clubs can organize to help their local school, plant gardens, save parks, plan local greening efforts, and keep their neighborhood vibrant. Block clubs create a powerful voice for the community and are the backbone of an organized neighborhood!

If you want to begin a block club, where do you start? First, introduce yourself to the families living around you. Tell them who you are, where you live, and that you are interested in creating a block club. At this time, you may want to gather phone numbers, addresses, and email information. You can cover as much or as little ground as fits your neighborhood. Some block clubs are exclusive to the street while others include two or three blocks.

After you have met your neighbors, it's time to plan a meeting. Pick a date, time, and gathering place. Backyards, driveways, and living rooms make for great meeting spots. Our community also has plenty of spots to choose from, including the Kamm's Corners Development Corporation Community Room. Next, get the info out there. Pass out flyers, make phone calls, send out emails, and knock on doors!

It is helpful to have a written agenda going into the first meeting. An agenda is like a map for the meeting. It explains where the meeting will go and how it will get there. It also helps define a meeting's purpose. Input from your neighbors can help determine the content of the agenda.

Now that you have brought a group of neighbors together, be sure to find out when they can meet again. Schedule the next meeting during the first meeting so that you will be able to start publicizing it right away. You can use the contact list that you have already created to help reach out to those who were not able to make the first meeting, but might be able to make the next one.

It may take some time before your block club takes shape and finds its role in the community. However, if you're reading this, you've already completed one of the hardest steps: you've begun!

Local Foundation Helps Youngsters Communicate

West Park residents Joe Pulizzi and Pam Kozelka built a successful business, Content Marketing Institute, and internationally recognized event, Content Marketing World, to help brands find their voices and tell their stories. Additionally, since 2014, they have channeled their resources and expertise to empower children and young adults by creating The Orange Effect Foundation.

The foundation strives to make sure that everyone gains the ability to communicate. The foundation, while officially formed in 2014, actually began back in 2001, when the Pulizzi's son Joshua was born with autism. Early intervention has led him to be an independent and engaging young man. Knowing the importance that early intervention had for their son, Pam and Joe wanted to help other children and young adults receive the speech therapy and tools they need communicate effectively and lead fulfilling lives.

In 2007, Golf for Autism was started, an annual fundraiser that has donated over \$100,000 directly to the Easter Seals of Northern Ohio, Autism, and Speech Therapy Services, over the years. Their son, Joshua, speaks every year at the event.

Since the Orange Effect Foundation began accepting and awarding grant applications in December 2015, the foundation has assisted children and young adults in Northeast Ohio and throughout the United States including New Jersey, Texas, and Idaho. The foundation awards grants for speech and sign language therapy and funds assistive communication devices for individuals who are nonverbal.


Pam explains, "We were so lucky. We found early intervention and tackled issues head on, with full force." Today, Joshua is thriving at St. Edward High School and is an active member of his freshman class. "We are so fortunate that he is able to express himself to the world around him now.

Pam and Joe's wish is for every family to get that same opportunity and feel that same joy. "It might not be vocal communication, it might be sign language, an iPad, or a hearing aid. Whatever it takes to communicate, to get that connection. The Orange Effect foundation is here for just that. If you can help by donating that is great, but as importantly, if you know a family struggling, encourage them to apply for funding."




West Park Calendar 2017 Makes a Fine Gift



That renewed tax, which was set to expire in January, 2017, will provide another 10 years for CAC to invest in local arts and culture programs.




