Dear Neighbor:

Where did 2017 go? I can't believe it's already mid-November and here's the holiday magazine! At least the Municipal Election season is now behind us! Thanks to everyone who voted, and congratulations to all victors! Running for public office is not the easiest thing to do, but we have some exciting new talent entering the public arena. Regardless of candidate or issue, taking the time to cast your vote is as important as any civic duty. Our voter turnout here was better than previous years and certainly the best in the City of Cleveland, but we can always do better.

Construction season is wrapping up this month. Rocky River Drive continues to cause most of my gray, or gone, hair. The sewer project replaced our combined sanitary and storm sewers with separate systems. This goes a long way in ensuring dramatically different flows going to the proper destinations. Protecting our lake and waterways remains a primary focus. Thank you to all who showed tremendous patience and understanding as the Division of Water Pollution Control and their contractors completed the job.

The same may be said for Rockport Avenue. We knew it was going to get messy, but nobody was prepared for that daily disruption. Larchwood Avenue west of the Drive started as a local resurfacing project and turned into a major sewer job. Multiple house connections required replacement before the resurfacing could proceed. Thank you to all the residents of both streets for showing great patience. The end somewhat justifies the means and hopefully we will soon forget about the dust and incessant beeping noises in two great neighborhoods.

Curbside leaf pickup returns to designated areas. The Administration has elected to primarily focus on the areas that had received the service prior to the State imposed budget cuts. I couldn't disagree more. Any service to Ward 17 must be available to all of Ward 17. I've made my objections quite clear and as Issue 32 dollars continue to boost our General Fund Budget, we hope to amend the service areas next year. Please refrain from placing leaves in the street until the signs

are posted. Piled leaves cause detrimental effects when not picked up quickly. They blow into your neighbor's yard, clog catch basins, and inhibit storm water from flowing properly, which results in pooling storm water and flooding. Also, remember that the program is weather dependent. The crews will do their best within the scenarios Mother Nature provides.

November also brings a close to most of our Block Watch activities, but there are still a few new clubs forming. September and October were pretty busy as First District Commander Dan Fay and I spoke to block clubs from Larchwood to Rainbow, Laverne to Scullin, and had a good start in getting Birchwood back up and running. Block Clubs are a great way to get together and talk to your neighbors about what's really going on, from all the great things happening to some less than great. Please don't hesitate to call my office if interested in starting one.

Keeping neighborhoods safe remains our prime objective. Remember to keep your belongings secure. Do not leave valuables in your vehicle. Also, please lock your doors. Sadly, some people want to take stuff that doesn't belong to them. If we make it difficult for them, they will go away. Light up your home. Also, do not ever give personal information over the telephone. Any unanticipated request that makes you reach for your wallet or purse should immediately make you question the person on the other line. There is a subset of society that preys on good-hearted people who like to help when able. Please keep your personal information private until you have fully vetted the situation. And, if they can't wait, then you say you are not interested. Legitimate businesses will always wait and provide the necessary assurances.

Remember to support our local businesses this Holiday Season. They are the heartbeat of West Park. Our retail corridors are bustling with activity with merchants more than happy to serve your needs. From my family to yours, we wish you the healthiest and happiest of holiday seasons!

Puritas Nursery Holiday Trains Return November 25 Complete with Visits from Santa!



Toy train displays are a family favorite for the holiday season – and Puritas Nursery has one of the finest holiday model train displays in the region. Join the families who return year after year to

build fond memories of a cherished tradition. There is no charge to enjoy the variety of locomotives traveling through miniature villages and living vegetation inside the heated greenhouse at 19201 Puritas Avenue.

This year marks the nursery's 15th annual holiday train show, which is their most popular event of the year. Twelve model trains of three different sizes can be seen on three distinct layouts. The main HO gauge layout is on a beautifully landscaped 8' x 30' table with five trains and three trolleys chugging through hills and valleys of live trees, shrubs, and flowing water. Living plants include miniature evergreens and conifers along with herbs and junipers. Poinsettias add color and may be purchased right off the train layout.


Children may cut through the two carpeted tunnels beneath the display as a "kids only" shortcut from one side of the layout to the other. The size, extent, and variety of the displays make for great family photos, so cameras are welcome.

The G scale layout features several captivating garden themed scenes, including Wizard of Oz, Lion King, Kamm's Corners Farmers Market, a circus, Star Wars, and a fairy garden. Young and old are invited to a scavenger hunt to locate various items in the displays. Children are encouraged to try the O-scale track that allows them to run Thomas the Train themselves!

Presented by hobbyist Mark Gombar, the Lionel O gauge layout spreads across a 4' x 30' area utilizing four trail loops across rural, urban, and wintry scenes with lots of action for kids to enjoy. Dave Power was also very helpful on the Lionel display. Dave Craven, was instrumental in setting up the G gauge layout.

The main HO display was designed by Dan Gryczan, an ardent model railroad enthusiast and a good friend to Puritas Nursery. He and owner Dale Heyink work with the entire nursery staff and numerous volunteers to construct the displays.

Santa visits from 1 to 3 p.m. twice during the season: on Saturday, December 2 and 9. Personal photos with Santa are encouraged and are free of charge! The event runs through December 31. For more information and photos from previous years' events, visit *puritasnursery.com*.

Storefront Renovation

It has been a busy year for the Storefront Renovation Program in the Kamm's Corners neighborhood. Several projects are either recently completed or underway.

The program, a partnership of the City of Cleveland and Kamm's Corners Development Corporation, offers design and financial assistance to business owners for new signage and to property owners for exterior building renovations.

Among the recently completed projects are 5 Points Coffee & Tea, 3600 West Park Road, a locally-owned start-up cafe that offers coffee, tea, pastries, and soup. The project transformed the building from a vacant, dilapidated structure into an updated, neighborhood asset with a vibrant new business.

Only In Cley, 17025 Lorain Avenue, is an apparel and gift shop that relocated from Lakewood earlier this year and received assistance for their new sign over the summer.

Work has been completed on the building at 15718 Lorain Avenue, home of Lorain Triskett Bicycle. The improvements included replacing a damaged pole sign with a new sign, installing landscaped beds in front of the property, re-painting the building, adding brick pavers, and mounting a new awning.

The VIP Inn, 4107 Rocky River Drive, recently finished a complete makeover to the building by converting the formerly solid brick facade to a more open, inviting appearance with new storefront glass windows. The project included the addition of a covered patio and a new sign.

Construction is underway on the HKM Building at 15708 Lorain Avenue. The building had been vacant for several years and suffered in appearance and condition from deferred maintenance. Interior and exterior renovations—including new windows. masonry repairs, painting, awnings, and signage have breathed new life into the building. The new property owner will locate his accounting and tax service in the rear of the building and lease out the storefront space.

Finally, Hatfield's Goode Grub, the restaurant that opened at 16700 Lorain Avenue, is participating in the program for assistance for a handsome new permanent sign that mirrors the graphic design on their food truck.

Artist Transforms Weathered Wood

A wood stump, neglected and decaying, becomes an object of natural beauty under the care of West Park resident Ron Bonoan, who transforms otherwise forgotten parts of trees left in the woods into art worthy of admiration and display. Tree roots like a mermaid's hair, flow from a felled sapling now turned upside down as the base of a glass-topped table. A piece of driftwood gleams in a high polish of sophistication atop

a book case. A knotted slab of wood becomes an attractive foot stool.



These are among the more than 150 pieces Ron created during the past year and a half. "I started working with wood as a teen, but repurposing natural tree parts is new for me," said Ron. "Simply walking through the woods, I discovered a compassion for a natural resource that most people feel is unlimited: trees. I started thinking about how long some of these dead and dying pieces had lived and wanted to provide a second life - one

of admiration and appreciation."

He chooses natural pieces that show some character, whether by the effects of storm, wind, or water. He then cures the wood. This can take months to even a year. Sometimes he removes the bark, but other times it remains for added interest.

When he's not out in the woods keeping his eyes open for potential pieces or working on them, Ron is a Realtor with Howard Hanna Real Estate Services. He lives with his wife in West Park.

His unique designs are available to view and purchase from his Imaginations Creations Elmwood Avenue studio by appointment. That is where



With grant funding awarded by Cuyahoga County, Kamm's Corners Development Corporation is coordinating a multi-phase project to improve and enhance the perimeter of the City-owned parking lot at West 168th Street and Albers Avenue. Landscaping improvements focused on the street frontages along West 168th Street and Albers Avenue as well as the public walkway between Back Stage Bar and Walgreens. These improvements included the removal of four trees, tree trimming, weed and shrub removal, and the addition of new top soil with grass seed. The next phase of the project will involve the construction of a new storage shed for the Kamm's Corners Farmers Market and the installation of wall sconce light fixtures along the public walkway between Back Stage and Walgreens. Updating the sign at the main entrance to the parking lot on Albers Avenue will constitute the final phase of the project.

The Kamm's Area Special Improvement District (KASID) has completed the replanting of all the street planters on Lorain Avenue between West 165 Street and the Public House at 17219 Lorain. For the winter of 2017-18, KASID will purchase a gator with a snow plow for sidewalk snow removal in the district.






KCDC Staffer Joins Department of Aging



City of Cleveland Reactivates Seasonal Leaf Pick-up Program

Cleveland Clinic Lakewood and Fairview Hospital Emergency Departments are Ready 24/7 for Seasonal Mishaps and More

The change of seasons often brings unexpected mishaps which may require a trip to the emergency department (ED). It's good to know that you're just minutes away from comprehensive emergency care in two locations.

Cleveland Clinic Lakewood and Cleveland Clinic Fairview Hospital EDs are available 24/7, and staffed by board-certified emergency medicine physicians and certified emergency nurses with training to respond to a spectrum of urgent medical issues.

"This time of year, we tend to see backto-school illnesses and injuries related to sports or work around the home, as well as illnesses related to flu or upper respiratory disease," says James Mark, MD, medical director of the Emergency Department at Fairview Hospital.

"As temperatures cool and furnaces are switched on, patients come to the ED with symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning, which are often mistaken for flu symptoms," says Judith Welsh, MD, medical director of the Emergency Department at Lakewood.

If you have symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning – such as a dull headache, weakness, dizziness, nausea or confusion – do not attempt to treat the condition yourself. "Access fresh air immediately and call 911," says Dr Welsh.

Dr. Mark and Dr. Welsh offer insight into five common seasonal maladies and when to seek care:

Gaping cuts (that cannot gently be pressed closed) or those with jagged edges typically require stitches. Even small cuts on the face, eyelids, lips, palms, or fingers may require stitches, as the skin is taut and difficult to heal. Seek medical help if the cut is deep enough to expose the dermis or yellow subcutaneous fatty tissue; if a dirty or rusty object caused the injury, especially if you have not had a recent tetanus vaccination; or if the wound shows signs of infection.

If raking leaves or shoveling snow leads to chest pain, shortness of breath, or pain in the arms, these may be signs of a heart attack, and you should go to the emergency department immediately. If these activities cause muscular pain in your arms, shoulders, knees, and upper and lower back, you can start treating the injury at home. Rest, apply ice to the area (20 minutes on, 20 minutes off), and try nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory medications (NSAIDs - ibuprofen, naproxen, aspirin), or acetaminophen. Your injury may need attention if there is bone misalignment and/or deformity; a change in color (e.g. an injured ankle or foot is turning blue); you can't walk or use the injured limb: there is bleeding or a break in the skin, and continued severe pain and/or swelling.

Norovirus – the most common cause of gastroenteritis, often mislabeled as "stomach flu" – typically peaks between December and April. Common symptoms include nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal pain, and, on occasion, a lowgrade fever. If you are suffering, avoid solid foods until nausea and vomiting ends and drink clear fluids to prevent dehydration. Seek treatment if symptoms last more than two days or you have severe stomach pain, fever, or signs of dehydration. Frequent handwashing is the best way to prevent norovirus.

Air pollution, high pollen levels, and increased mold growth due to high humidity can cause a spike in asthma attacks. Symptoms include difficulty breathing, wheezing, coughing, shortness of breath, and difficulty performing daily activities. The severity of an asthma attack can escalate rapidly, so it's important to see a doctor if these symptoms occur.

Swimmers ear and ear infections are especially common in children. Ear infections occur when fluid or other debris gets trapped in the middle ear and becomes infected. Symptoms of an ear infection include pain in the ear, and trouble sleeping or eating. Antibiotics are often prescribed as treatment.

From strains, sprains, and infections, to trauma and stroke, the Emergency Departments at Fairview Hospital and Lakewood are ready to respond quickly.

The design and triage process at both EDs has expedited patient care and significantly reduced wait times. "It's called the split flow process, and the goal is to get patients to the appropriate level of care faster," says Dr. Mark. "With this process, all patients are assessed shortly after arrival. Those with less serious conditions are assigned to a special area in which they can be seen quickly, keeping beds available for the sickest patients."

The mission of Fairview Hospital's Emergency Department is to provide care for ill or injured patients in a competent and caring manner. Staffed by board-certified emergency physicians and certified emergency nurses, it offers a Pediatric ED which cares for children in a family-friendly environment. In place at all Cleveland Clinic ED's, the "split-flow" triage process has led to more efficient patient processing and reduced wait times.

"Lakewood ED is terrific at helping manage the health of the community," reflects Dr. Welsh. "Patients are linked with our providers, or a community partner, for care after they leave the ED, which can reduce future emergency visits. Additionally, Lakewood ED offers on-site radiology (X-ray, ultrasound, CT, MRI) and lab services. And, caregivers are trained to provide specialized care for patients who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT)."

In an emergency, call 911 or go to an emergency department near you.

The Barthelman Family ...by Gary Swilik

The Barthelman Family has a long history in West Park. First to arrive was Johann Christoph Barthelman who came to the U.S. in 1840 from Germany. Here he met and married his wife, Johanna, also a native of Germany. The couple lived along Settlement Road, now West 130th, and accumulated a great deal of land in that area.

In 1876, Johann bought property the corner of Rocky River Drive and Lorain Avenue. This area was called Kamm's Corners, named for Oswald Kamm's store and post office. That building still stands at the south west corner, currently vacant.

Johann died only a year later in 1877, but made arrangements in his will to distribute his land among his sons. As a result, in 1888, the family property at Kamm's Corners came into the ownership of his son Frederick Barthelman.

In about 1890, Frederick built a spacious farmhouse on the south side of Lorain Avenue at 17401 Lorain Avenue, west of Kamm's Store, where he lived with his wife Katherine and growing family. This house stood for many years but ultimately gave way to the commercialization of Lorain Avenue and was demolished sometime in the 1930s.

Meanwhile, in about 1920, Frederick built a second house on Lorain Avenue that became his new permanent residence. This house was eventually moved to 3906 Rocky River Drive, at the corner of Fernshaw Avenue, and now serves as the office of orthodontist Casey L. O'Conor. After a lifetime in the West Park area, Frederick Barthelman passed away in 1932 at eighty-years of age.

By that time, Frederick's son Henry had been active in Barthelman Family enterprises for many years. In 1902, Henry established the Barthelman Dairy delivering milk throughout Rockport Township in horse-drawn wagons. The dairy was a great commercial success, allowing Henry to sell the business to Earl Blain in 1914, and semi-retire in his early thirties.

In about 1914, Henry became Treasurer of the Cleveland Motor Car Sales Company, which sold Nash Automobiles to a public falling in love with the open road. Henry, who showed a particular talent for the world of finance, served as a director for the West Park Bank and the Thrift Federal Savings and Loan Company.

Not long after leaving the dairy business, Henry also began operating a successful greenhouse. In about 1922 he enlarged the business and, with other members of the Barthelman Family, created United Greenhouses Incorporated. This became a big operation with over twenty acres under glass. Their tomatoes were sold locally and shipped around the country.


Henry also built a new road, running west from Rocky River Drive, just south of Lorain Avenue. Originally named Clarence Road, in honor of Henry's first child, the name was later changed to Fernshaw Avenue.

In 1924, Henry built yet another family home which still stands today at 17219 Fernshaw Avenue. (All the Barthelman homes in the area get confusing!) Henry Barthelman died in 1966 at age 84.

Robert Barthelman, son of Henry and grandson of Frederick, was born in 1912 on the dining room table of the house built by his grandfather at 17401 Lorain Avenue. Robert served as president of the United Greenhouse Company for many years. In 1939, he and his wife Lucille built Olympic Recreation at West 176th and Lorain, one of the first family-oriented bowling alleys in the nation.

They operated Olympic Recreation from 1939 to 1972 when they sold the business. The building was demolished in 1987 and the site is now a parking lot for Fairview Park Hospital. Older West Parkers will recall Robert also operated The Polar Bar, an ice cream stand on the south side of Lorain, across from Olympic Recreation, from about 1942 to 1950.

Robert Barthelman passed away in 2008 at age 96. His wife Lucille died in 2010 also at age 96. The Barthelman Family was active in the development of Kamm's Corners for more than a century.



Many Clevelanders are not aware of the 2013 plan undertaken by the city to address climate change. Plan details are available at: https://tinyurl.com/y82rypks.

To support the CCAP:

- Replace incandescent light bulbs with more efficient bulbs, such as LEDs.
- Schedule a home energy audit to identify areas in your home with the greatest energy efficiency potential, and take advantage of programs like Energy Saver (https://energy.gov/eere/ femp/energy-incentive-programs-ohio).
- Purchase Energy Star rated appliances and electronics.
- Turn off electronic devices when not in use: computers, monitors, printers, televisions, and audio equipment. If the red light is on, it's using energy most likely produced by coal.
- Sign the "Power Pledge" (at *leedco.org*) to support the Lake Erie Energy Development Company's offshore wind project.
- Purchase renewable energy through aggregation: https://tinyurl.com/ ychi7jbq.
- Walk and bike to home and business destinations in our neighborhood.
- Use public transportation when traveling any distance.
- Lower your water bills by installing a rain barrel or rain garden. This may result in a flat reduction of 25% in your bill (https://www.neorsd.org/about).
- Reduce use of plastic by taking reusable shopping bags to the store.
 The blue plastic bags cannot be recycled. They damage and jam the city's recycling equipment.
- Review city recycling guidelines to understand what materials can be recycled. Do not bag recyclables for curb side pickup. That creates an extra step for recycling center workers. Just put them loose in the blue bin.

Remember, your actions make a difference!

Every weekday throughout the school year, after-school crafts take place, beginning at 3:30 p.m.



Construction Underway at Congregation of Saint Joseph

We are also excited to announce a partnership between the Sisters of Saint Joseph and Saint Joseph Academy that will enable the academy to renovate the existing motherhouse for an adaptive reuse for its students, faculty, and staff."

For almost 120 years, the sisters and Saint Joseph Academy have anchored the West Park neighborhood. Sister Conway said, "Partnering with the academy to adapt the motherhouse for their use will enable students to learn and thrive in a building that holds our history, but not our future," said Sister Nancy. "We support the academy's efforts to look forward as we ourselves start a new chapter on this same property with the hopes that all of us – sisters, academy students, faculty and staff, employees of the congregation, and staff and affiliates of River's Edge – will continue to carry forward the values of the Gospel and our mission of unifying love."

Mary Ann Corrigan Davis, President of Saint Joseph Academy, concurs. "This is an exciting time for all of us on this campus and we are eager to bring the energy of our students to this special building. We are grateful to the Sisters of Saint Joseph for their generosity and support."

Plans for the renovation of the motherhouse are set to begin in 2019, after the sisters and River's Edge have moved to the new building being constructed on the northwest portion of the property. The sisters ask for the community's continued support as the congregation embarks on another bold and courageous new chapter for the sisters and the academy.



Kamm's Cat Guardians Help to Make Feral Cats Better Neighbors

Cats are everywhere it seems. Whether you love them or hate them, the one undeniable fact is that we all want to see fewer feral cats in the neighborhood. In many areas, feral cats do serve an essential roll as part of the ecosystem by keeping the rodent population at bay. In fact, some companies and cities have feline "employees" to do just that, thus eliminating the need for toxic chemicals.

The disliked things about feral cats is that they may eat a bird at your bird feeder, use your mulch as a litter box, and one pair plus all their descendants may produce up to 420,000 more cats in 7 years. But there is a humane way the community can come together to ensure a reduction in the feral cat population if people are all willing to work together and learn the best methods available to reach this goal.

Who Are the Kamm's Cat Guardians?

They are a local non-profit organization with a goal to educate and advocate for the stray and feral cat population in the Kamm's Corners community and to do it in such a way to benefit not only the cats, but both those who love them and those who don't.

So here is what they CAN do:

- Assist with TNR, also known as Trap-Neuter-Return, by loaning traps and providing information
- Provide an information packet containing directions for trapping and a list of resources
- Assist with actual trapping and transport if the caller is elderly or disabled
- Support TNR efforts with educational materials via their Facebook page, website, and PetFinder site
- Provide winter shelters for those caring for feral cats (known as colony quardians) and provide guidance on how to prevent those ferals from becoming a nuisance to neighbors
- Maintain a confidential registry of those colony guardians so there can be a sharing of duties and to provide respite relief.
- Provide whatever information is available for TNR services outside of the Kamm's Corners community.
- Conduct periodic TNR workshops.
- Provide information on how to deter cats from harming gardens and birds.

Here is what they CANNOT do:

- They will not take in cats; they are NOT a rescue. They only list kittens or cats on their PetFinder page that were trapped as a part of the TNR process and were unclaimed strays or feral cats that have been socialized to live inside with humans.
- They cannot provide any assistance with personal pets.

Remember: TNR (Trap-Neuter-Return) will help make feral cats better neighbors. Neutered males make dramatically less noise as the result of reduced mating behavior and eliminate the foul odors caused by spraying; female cats will do less howling. Plus neutered cats roam much less so they are less visible, and there are no more litters of kittens.
