We have had a productive year here at KCDC, but there is so much more to do! Our engaged Board of Trustees and KCDC Staff recently completed a retreat where we reviewed accomplishments, set new directions and goals, and charted a path forward. Stay tuned over the next few months as we refine and advance these initiatives.

The Kamm's Area Special Improvement District (KASID) has been renewed for a 5-year term. This is the result of property owners in our "downtown" agreeing to assess themselves, creating a fund of \$30,000 annually to keep the area clean, maintain the planters, install holiday lighting and banners, clear the snow, and complete other activities that add to the attractiveness and vibrancy of the district. Hats off to these generous property owners!

We had a great season at the Kamm's Corners Farmers Market, now one of the most "senior" farmers markets in Cleveland. We appreciate the support of Cuyahoga Arts and Culture for supplying the funding to pay our musical artists. Thanks also to our vendors, some of whom have been with us from the beginning. They are the heart of the market. There will be one Holiday Market, detailed in the pages that follow.

We also welcomed several new businesses into the neighborhood, most recently Triumph Cleveland and Two Sons Tattoo. We will continue our efforts to attract new businesses and help current businesses grow and expand. Part of those efforts include being chosen for Cleveland State University's "Capstone Project," a study that will help us look at the best uses for the commercial properties and associated land from the former Kmart east to the rapid tracks. The study will commence in January and will help us guide future development.

The 15th anniversary of our only fundraiser of the year, Wine in the Holidays, is being celebrated with a refresh of the name of the event, now West Park Holiday Cheer. Look for details on page 6, and please join us to support our efforts to advance West Park.

As we move into the holidays, remember your neighbors, especially our seniors, who often experience isolation in the winter. And don't forget to patronize our LOCAL merchants!

Dear Neighbor:

Happy Holidays! There have been some great successes and tough times in the neighborhood this year. New businesses opened while a couple of long standing partners moved on. Most important is to appreciate the good we have. Holidays can be a tough time for some. It helps if everyone makes an extra effort to check in on, say hello to, or just be kind to others. It can make a positive difference.

Another election season is behind us! Congratulations to the victors and thanks to all for answering the call to public service. Our system is not perfect. But it is free, and to all those who voted, I say thank you! It is a sacred right bestowed on us by our rich history. Casting a vote is the bedrock our our system of government.

In the neighborhoods, a strong housing market continues. While "For Sale" signs are not my favorites, they indicate a thriving real estate market for people who wish to call West Park home! Safety and schools top the list in discussions with prospective residents and new arrivals. Safe neighborhoods are driven by the people who live here. Taking care of our properties and looking out for our neighbors remains the number one deterrent to criminal activity. Crime does happen. But a good group of neighbors or a strong block watch has a significant positive impact.

We remain in discussions with the Cleveland Metropolitan School District about the future of Valleyview and Douglass MacArthur Schools. Hopefully, we can get the state funding issues resolved and move forward. Yet, our neighborhood remains an attractive location for school choice, whether public or private, parochial or charter. Options are many.

Curbside leaf pick-up has returned to designated areas until the end of the year. Despite recommendations to expand, the service areas remain

the same. Leaf pick-up will occur only after orange signs are posted on a street indicating that it will be serviced the next week. This is not open season to rake leaves from the yard into the street every week. Those leaves will end up in your neighbor's yard, which isn't fair, or down the sewer. Instead, rake leaves onto the tree lawn when notice is provided. Pick-up is weather dependent. Should it snow, you'll have to bag your leaves like the rest of the Ward. The program ends with 2018. Last year, neighbors raked leaves into the street well into February. No one is coming to get those leaves. Please understand, while Council budgets for a curbside program, Council does not choose the streets nor the schedule.

The loss of the Kmart at Lorain and West 150th Street is significant. Their departure should not be interpreted as a bad reflection on our neighborhood nor the City. The same can be said for Fifth Third Bank on Rocky River Drive. All indicators were it was a healthy branch with good numbers and a strong customer base. In both closings, bigger market forces were at play. Our job is to work closely with the property owners to find uses that add value to our neighborhood. All parties agree. We are currently struggling with illegal dumping and an illegal truck stop at Kmart. Through cooperation of ownership and constant support from our First District Police staff, we are taking steps in the right direction. Keeping those lines of communication open will result in positive change for both locations.

At this time of year, I stress the importance of shopping locally! Showcase our retail corridors to friends and family by shopping and dining here. Our small businesses take a chance on us. Let's show them how much we appreciate them. From my family to yours, we wish you a healthy and happy holiday season!

Puritas Nursery Holiday Trains Return November 23



The holiday season is upon us, brightened by decorations peeking onto the streets from house windows and adorning front lawns, lighting up our storefronts and public spaces. Twinkling lights, greenery, and yes, even toy trains

add to the festive decor. For 16 years, here in West Park, the sight of trains winding through miniature scenes at Puritas Nursery have delighted kids and kids at heart.

Dale Heyink, proprietor, and his crew of employees and volunteers have put together the finest holiday model train displays in Cleveland. Join the families who visit year after year to build fond memories of a cherished tradition. There is no charge to enjoy the variety of locomotives traveling through miniature villages and living vegetation inside the heated greenhouse at 19201 Puritas Avenue.

This year marks the nursery's 16th annual holiday train show, which is their most popular event of the year. Twenty model trains of three different sizes roll along three distinct layouts. The main HO gauge layout is on a beautifully landscaped 8' x 30' table with five trains and three trolleys chugging through hills and valleys of live trees, shrubs, and flowing water. Living plants include miniature evergreens and conifers along with herbs and junipers. Poinsettias add color and may be purchased right off the train layout.


Children may cut through the two carpeted tunnels beneath the display as a shortcut from one side of the layout to the other. The size, extent, and variety of the displays make for great family photos, so cameras are welcome.

The G scale layout features several captivating themed scenes, including Wizard of Oz, Lion King, a circus, Star Wars, and a fairy garden. Note the tiny replica of Kamm's Corners Farmers Market! Young and old are invited to a scavenger hunt to locate various items in the displays. Children are encouraged to try the O-scale track that allows them to run Thomas the Train themselves!

Presented by hobbyist Mark Gombar, Dave Powers, and Dave Craven, the Lionel O gauge layout spreads across a 7' x 30' area utilizing six rail loops across rural, urban, and wintry scenes with lots of action for kids to enjoy.

The main HO display was designed by Dan Gryczan, an ardent model railroad enthusiast and a good friend to Puritas Nursery. He and owner Dale Heyink work with the entire nursery staff and numerous volunteers to construct the displays.

New Lighting Brightens Memorial Walkway

On Thursday, November 1, a team of volunteers headed by Jonathan McCaffertv Kichler Lighting installed new lights at the West Park Police and Firefighters Memorial Walkway. Kichler Lighting donated all the materials and designed the lighting installation.

Contractor Dan **Husney of Litescapes** by Husney was assisted by Anthony Santurri and Bret Korcykoski of RK Sales in installing a light below each flag. The work was com-

pleted in a driving rain! Jonathan McCafferty reported, "We put in a new 200-watt transformer and 24 new LED fixtures (full product name 12V LED Accent with VLO). We removed the old fixtures that used 35 watt bulbs, and the new bulbs can be integrated using only 5.5 watts. This is an 85% reduction in energy usage, saving the city money."

The positive response to amateur photos of the new lights on the West Park Neighborhood Facebook page has been overwhelming with 270 likes being posted in 24 hours!

All labor and materials for this installation were donated.

City of Cleveland Reactivates Seasonal Leaf Pick-up Program in Designated Areas

Starting in November and ending December 31, eight leaf vacuum vehicles are being used to pick-up curb side leaves in designated areas. You will know if your street is included by viewing the orange signs that will be posted one week prior to service. Please note! To streamline the process, residents are encouraged to rake leaves from their property onto their tree lawns, not into the streets.

To accommodate city crews, residents are asked to park off-street during the service period. Each area will be serviced at least twice during the eight-week period, weather permitting. Leaves will be transported to the approved leaf compost site, diverting more than 2,000 tons of leaf material from the waste stream. If your street is not included or if inclement weather prevents pickup, bag your leaves as usual. Don't just leave them in the street!

Local Funeral Directors Offer Tips to Prepare for the Inevitable

None of us likes to talk about death or funerals – especially our own! But, at some point, you are going to be exiting this life and will need some sort of funeral or memorial service. Why not make it easier for your family and also guarantee the send-off you want by planning your own ahead of time? Chances are you'll be seeing family over the winter holidays. Why not broach the subject in a light-hearted way? Then, go into deeper planning shortly afterwards.

To plan a funeral, you need to know what happens at one. For advice and to learn what's involved in funerals today, I spoke with four local funeral directors: Dan Chambers of Chambers Funeral Home, Dean Schreiber of Corrigan-Craciun Funeral Home, Sally Donlon Armstrong of Donlon Funeral Home, and David G. Martens, Jr. of David G. Martens & Son Funeral Home.

Learn what's involved

There are three components to a funeral: preparing the body, holding the ceremony, and handling the burial. A range of options are available for each. Do you want embalming or cremation? All of our local funeral directors agreed that cremation is on the rise. Last year, for the first time in America, cremations exceeded traditional burials. "Even older people are choosing cremation," said David Martens. "That's a huge change from what was happening in my dad's day. It is not uncommon to have a oneday viewing followed by cremation and a celebration of life or memorial service."

Plan in advance

A third-generation family operator of Chambers Funeral Home, Dan Chambers said his father and grandfather would be surprised at all the changes. "Back in their day, most people had a two-day wake and then the funeral. Today, it is often all in one

day. People don't go back to the house; they go to a catering facility or return to the funeral home for a reception. We have remodeled the building next to ours (where the Saint Patrick credit union used to be) to hold a reception for 50 people. Our Berea location holds 100 or more. Remember, often times families are coming from out of town and appreciate a meal and time to talk with seldom seen friends and family."

So, will it be a traditional burial with or without embalming. Or will the body be cremated, with or without a viewing first? Will there be a full service at a funeral home, a grave-side service, or simply an informal memorial at a restaurant or catering facility? Will there be a burial in the ground or in a tomb? Or will the ashes be scattered someplace meaningful or kept in an urn?

"Sometimes the body is donated to science," said Sally Donlon Armstrong, also a third-generation funeral director. "Even when there is no body to view, a memorial offers comfort and closure. Callers express their love for the deceased, which takes away some of the pain.

A former Baptist minister, Dean Schreiber of Corrigan-Craciun Funeral Home is a relatively new funeral director. He started out helping families planning a funeral ahead of need, which is not uncommon. "Women are more inclined to talk about and plan for funerals. Not men! So, a couple will come in together and sit down to talk about it wisely usually at the urging of the wife," he explained. "After all, premature death does happen! Nobody plans for the accident or stroke."

Talk it over and write it down

All of our funeral directors agreed that planning relieves your loved ones from guessing what you would have wanted. If you don't know the many options available, talk it over with the funeral director of your choice. Then tell your loved ones what sort of funeral you'd like to have and how much you want to spend. Be specific, but realize your family may not be able to deliver on everything you want. "Planning involves all close family members," said David Martens. "This avoids having three children come in with three different ideas on what mom wanted, and not really knowing because it was never discussed.

How much better for a bereaved widow to be able to state with certainty: "My husband said he always wanted to be buried at Holy Cross Cemetery, and we even purchased side-by-side graves."

Estimate the cost of your funeral

With the traditional funeral and a viewing costing an average of \$7,000, you need to treat this like any other large purchase. Shop around and buy only what you want. "People use the internet to research other alternatives to a traditional funeral to save money," said Dean Schreiber. "But, many times when you think you're cutting corners, you end up finding that you're creating added burdens and stress for yourself because you're not allowing the professionals to step in and help with work they are able to do quickly and efficiently due to practice. The TV and internet make it seem like so many things in life are easier to accomplish than they really are."

What funeral homes provide

All our neighborhood funeral homes have caring professionals doing work behind the scenes so well, so quickly, and so perfectly! This may lead some to conclude that the work is easy. But, a lot has gone on. In a matter of days, the funeral director and staff have walked through 50 to 100 steps to make a funeral happen. These include contacting the minister, singers, organist, the cemetery, and getting permits for burial or cremation. Then there's the runner for the funeral home who has gotten to the doctor's office to have the death certificate signed. All legal documentation has to be completed properly.

For a burial, the order for the burial has to be done making sure the section lot and grave number is selected, the burial clothes, perfect hair like in the photograph, casketing, transportation to the right funeral home – all this takes a group of people working in unison to make it happen.

The staff works very long days! Other services provided are the registration books, personalized prayer cards, and other printed materials. In addition to the photo boards, tribute videos are popular. They're available during the service and may be watched

online at the funeral home's website afterwards in some cases.

Why have a funeral or memorial service at all?

Such events provide surviving family members and friends with a caring, supportive environment in which to recognize the death of a loved one and to share thoughts and feelings about that person. "You can see how others loved your loved one," said Sally Donlon Armstrong. Dan Chambers added, "Taking the time and making the effort to go to a funeral or memorial service makes all the difference to a family in mourning. It beats a sad face emoji and one-line sentiment posted on social media."

The ritual of attending a service provides many benefits including:

- Providing a social support system for the bereaved
- Helping the bereaved understand death is final and part of life
- Integrating the bereaved back into the community
- Easing the transition to a new life after the death of a loved one
- Providing a safe haven for embracing and expressing pain
- Reaffirming one's relationship with the person who died
- Providing a time to say goodbye

Final thoughts

Can you picture a meaningful service for yourself? Let the funeral professionals in West Park walk you through all the steps and options available to you to make your wishes happen. They can share with you all the basics and even provide personalized funeral planning resources. Find out your payment options, too, including how to remove the burden of financial hardship on survivors. Be sure to make your wishes known! Ideally, provide a written record and keep it with your other important documents. Talk it over with your trusted loved ones and tell them how to find it.


Saint Joseph Academy Hosts Third Annual Christmas Fair Trade Boutique

The Jack Mulhall Center for Sober Living Helps Men Recover from Substance Abuse

Newly occupying the former convent of Saint Patrick Church, the Jack Mulhall Center for Sober Living is located at 4395 Rocky River Drive. Director Jack Patton discovered the location in 2016 after the building sat vacant for many years. It was in need of renovation, which was completed prior to its opening on September 1, 2018.

The in-house program provides adult men with a key piece in recovery from addiction. Primarily, it provides a structured living environment and services to 40

Historic Marquard House Demolished ...by Gary Swilik

In mid-October, the Marquard House at 3260 Warren Road came to the sad end so many feared. The home, well over 120-years-old, was leveled. Saint Mary Romanian Orthodox Cathedral, which owns the property, has plans for the now empty site.

Local builder Phil Marquard bought the home in 1908 when it was merely a farmhouse. Needing more space for his family of 12 children, he steadily remodeled the property until it reached a mansion-like 52 rooms, including a ballroom, chapel, and separate suites for his grown children. The elegant white-painted wood-frame house, surrounded by shade trees, its central entrance flanked by four tall decorative columns, was a landmark on Warren Road.

In its heyday, the surrounding grounds were beautifully landscaped to create a park-like playground with benches, swings, a maypole, and a giant wooden slide where the Marquards gathered for picnics and celebrations.

Phil Marquard's company, Marquard Home Builders, constructed hundreds of homes throughout Cleveland and was one of the primary developers of early West Park. It's been said that if all the homes the Marquard Company built were placed side-by-side they would stretch for eleven miles!

"I own a Marquard-built home," said Mike Kauntz of West 148th Street. "Marked by ornate woodwork and French doors, it exhibits fine craftsmanship. I still have the original windows and don't mind changing the screens and storms every season."

Wealthy but generous, Mr. Marquard donated to the Catholic Church and many local institutions, yet he always preferred his bequests remain anonymous. He passed away at the home in 1942 at age 74. The house was converted into apartments for war workers.

After the war, the Marquard House became a public apartment building known as Manor House Apartments with 17 three-to-five-room suites. It was still home to many renters in the early 2000s. Eventually the property fell into disrepair. It was empty and deteriorating at the time of its demolition.

Many felt a personal connection to the Marquard Home and are heart-broken that it's gone. "I'm disappointed and really down about this," commented West Parker Toni Geib, "I considered the house part of our neighborhood's historic identity."

"So sad," said Kathy Forlini Riley. "All the stories and history that went with that beautiful house and the Marquard family, which built it so many years ago. Even empty, the house was still so grand."

Marquard Family descendants and other groups made a sustained effort to save the house. Competing interests and economics ultimately proved to be an insurmountable challenge. Restoring the home reportedly carried a price tag of over \$800,000. Fortunately, West Park still has many significant historic sites to celebrate.





Seniors Helping Seniors

A Way to Give and to Receive

Seniors Helping Seniors is an in-home service that matches seniors who want to help others with seniors who need a little help in Western Cuyahoga County. This peer-to-peer assistance allows seniors to have simple needs met in a way that is caring and coming from someone they relate to – another senior, perhaps someone a bit younger and certainly nimbler. Services include:

Companionship:

Caregivers provide friendly conversation and companionship when caring for a fellow senior as much as the senior receiving care does. Regular interactions with a kind, friendly caregiver can help lift a senior's spirits and keep them mentally active and engaged.



Light Housekeeping: Assistance with light housekeeping includes laundering and changing bed linens, cleaning kitchens, dusting, vacuuming, sweeping, mopping, cleaning bathrooms, taking out the trash and recycling, cleaning interior windows that can be reached without a ladder, organizing closets and drawers, and general tidying around the house.

Cooking and shopping: For those in need of a little help, meals can be prepared as a team and trips to the grocery store can be made together. If more assistance is needed, the caregiver can shop at the grocery store and cook meals as part of the service.

The Shop Local model emphasizes the positive impact of shopping at locally owned business. Before going any further, we here KCDC acknowledge and appreciate the national chain stores that do business in our neighborhood.

The presence of these stores signifies their confidence in our market and are a sign that our neighborhood can support successful business activity. With that said, shopping locally brings added benefits to the regional economy. First, it is a foolproof way to accumulate wealth locally. Studies have shown that for every \$100 spent at locally owned stores, \$68 stays in the local economy. For every \$100 spent at a national chain, only \$43 remains in the local economy. Further, this local impact results in the creation of new jobs.

Second, another study showed that sales through local hardware and paint dealers have a local impact nearly seven times (676%) greater than sales through Amazon. Third, locally owned stores help make communities unique and become a destination for shoppers, tourists, and residents. Finally, shopping locally nurtures strong communities that support creativity and entrepreneurship and, in turn, local business owners who are more likely to donate their time, money, and expertise to local charities and organizations.

Based on the successful inauguration of the Kamm's Corners Holiday Passport, we are pleased to announce the return of this successful project for a second straight year. Last year, the program – the brain child of Lisa Kay of Kamm's Corners Ice Cream Co. and Conor Boylan of 5 Points Coffee & Tea, in partnership with KCDC – celebrated the establishment of six new, locally owned businesses in 2017. Shoppers were encouraged pick up the Holiday Passports and, if they visited the stores, they were eligible to enter

a drawing for donated prizes. Bonus points were given to shoppers who walked or biked to their destination.

This year, the project will be expanded to include more locally owned businesses in our neighborhood. The date projected to roll out this year's program is November 15, with the drawing for prizes to be held before Christmas Day. KCDC continues to collaborate with the local business community to produce quarterly Business Mixers. The goal of each event is to provide networking opportunities for merchants and commercial property owners and to share news about current local events. The location of the event changes each time to give different businesses the opportunity to host the mixer. Recent mixers highlighted new businesses with August's event hosted by Triumph Cleveland at 15101 Lorain Avenue, and last month's mixer was hosted by the owners of the recently opened Two Sons Tattoo at 16900 Lorain Avenue.

Prior reports that a construction project planned for the City-owned parking lot at West 168th Street and Albers Avenue would start this fall have proven to be optimistic. Plans are moving forward to install green infrastructure (bio retention basins and landscaping) to address storm water runoff and to resurface and restripe the entire parking lot.

Projections estimate the green infrastructure will divert almost one million gallons of storm water runoff out of the sewer system, which is a major goal in improving the water quality of Lake Erie. The City of Cleveland has put the project out to bid, a contractor has been selected, and work is now slated to start next spring and be completed by early summer. The funding is the result of a grant application prepared by KCDC, with the support of Councilman Marty Keane, and awarded by the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District. The City of Cleveland will manage the project construction.

If you read this column in the summer magazine issue, you would have learned about the Mission Boutique and their relocation to 16604 Lorain Avenue. Since that time, the store has installed a new sign that matches the design guidelines established for the building and received assistance from KCDC and the City of Cleveland's Storefront Renovation Program. It represents the 88th project completed in the life of the program in our community.

Also reported in the summer magazine were changes to the rebate incentives offered by the Storefront Renovation Program. Targeted to retail business owners and commercial property owners, the

incentives have been substantially enhanced.

The rebate for a building exterior renovation has been increased from 40% to 50% of the project costs and the maximum rebate amount has been raised from \$25,000 to \$30,000. Sign rebates have increased from 40% to 50% with the maximum rebate amount increased from \$3,000 to \$4,000. In addition to the financial assistance stated above, the program offers free design assistance or, if an architect is required, a 100% rebate of up to \$3,500 is available. 

New Technologies Aid in Diagnosis and Treatment of Prostate Cancer

According to the American Cancer Society, one in nine men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer, which develops mainly in older men. (African-American men are also at higher risk). The average age at diagnosis is 66.

"Recent advances in technology have improved the screening process for prostate cancer," says Robert Abouassaly, MD, a Cleveland Clinic urologist who treats patients at Fairview Hospital, as well as main campus. "Use of magnetic resonance imaging or MRI is now more common in diagnosing prostate cancer, and we're continuously learning more about how to interpret test results to better diagnose and treat patients."

MRI results are also helping to improve the accuracy of biopsies when needed. A recent study showed MRI-targeted biopsy led to a 12 percent increase in the detection of clinically significant prostate cancer and a 13 percent decrease in the detection of clinically insignificant prostate cancer.

"In addition to improved accuracy, screening MRI exams currently being investigated are quick, taking less than 15 minutes, compared to a standard prostate MRI that takes about an hour," says Dr. Abouassaly.

If clinically significant prostate cancer – meaning treatment is recommended—is diagnosed, there are improved treatment options available as well.

"Finasteride is a medication that has been around for a long time, typically used to treat benign prostatic hyperplasia or BPH, a common condition in which a benign

tumor grows inside the prostate, leading it to grow larger and causing issues with urination," says Dr. Abouassaly. "Recent studies have shown this drug is also very effective in decreasing a patient's risk of dying of prostate cancer."

Targeted treatment including the use of ablative technology like lasers, radiofrequency, or highintensity focused ultrasound to treat prostate cancer allows for increased accuracy – destroying cancer cells while preserving the rest of the prostate.

"As men age, their chances of being diagnosed with prostate cancer may be high, but their chances of dying from it are low. In the last two decades, we've seen a decrease in the number of prostate cancer related deaths," says Dr. Abouassaly. "We attribute this progress to these continuous improvements in screening and treatment."

City of Cleveland Launches Updated Climate Action Plan

Over the past year, the City of Cleveland's Office of Sustainability engaged more than 450 people to inform the updated Cleveland Climate Action Plan (CAP). The update maintains the goal of reducing greenhouse gas emissions 80% by 2050, with interim goals of 16% by 2020 and 40% by 2030. Implementing the CAP was a major focus of Mayor Frank G. Jackson's 10th Annual Sustainability Summit, that took place September 20 through 21 at Cleveland Public Auditorium.

"Given the U.S. withdrawal from the Paris Climate Agreement, it is even more important for Cleveland and other cities to lead on climate action," said Mayor Jackson. "This Cleveland Climate Action Plan is critical to ensuring we transition to a sustainable economy while cleaning the environment and protecting our most vulnerable residents."The plan includes 28 key objectives in six focus areas:

- Energy Efficiency and Green Building
- Clean Energy

- Sustainable Transportation
- Clean Water and Vibrant Green Space
- More Local Food, Less Waste
- Cross-Cutting Priorities

"This plan is about much more than climate change," said Chief of Sustainability Matt Gray. "This CAP update builds off our progress by firmly establishing a series of cross-cutting priorities:

- Social and racial equity
- Good jobs, green jobs
- Resilience to the impacts of climate change
- Business leadership."

This CAP update prioritized engagement and involved the community, including 90 members of the Climate Action Advisory Committee, 300 resident leaders who participated in 12 neighborhood workshops, and those who contributed to the 200 comments received during the public comment period. The commitment to update the initial 2013 plan and report publicly on its progress has elevated Cleveland nationally and across the globe.
