Dear Neighbor:

This time of year in Cleveland brings dreary rain revealing piles of old leaves and pot holes – lovely! I'm kidding, of course. Winter really took a toll on our streets. Even recently resurfaced streets are now showing early signs of decay.

We are sending reports of pot holes to the Streets Department, but the real work begins when the asphalt plants open. Then, hot patches will be placed over those moon craters. Please continue to report them by calling 216-664-2510. With more than 10,000 main and residential streets in the City of Cleveland, patching them all takes a while. In the meantime, please remain aware of their locations and drive carefully.

Speaking of pot holes and street repair, this time of year means working on the 2018 General Fund Budget for the City of Cleveland. Council has already gone through the Community Development Block Grant Hearings and began working on the General Fund on February 20. While the passing of Issue 32 makes our discussions easier than previous years, we still have a tremendous amount of work to do. This year's Budget includes almost \$623 million in expenditures with a total budget of more than \$1.7 billion, including Enterprise Funds.

Public Safety remains the primary focus for 2018, with more than 57% of the General Fund Budget dedicated to it. Budgeting includes a minimum of four police academy classes and bringing on an expected 150 officers in 2018 along with an additional 100 in the first quarter of 2019. Getting these officers deployed throughout the city and in our neighborhoods is very important.

Along with Public Safety, the Departments of Public Works, Building and Housing, and Public Health have an impact on quality-of-life issues and basic city services. Public Works is responsible for pot hole repair, street sweeping, waste collection, and more. Building and Housing will continue to expand the Rental Registration program to 57,000 rental units and homes. Focusing on life safety issues and lead hazards gains valuable information about landlords and tenants.

The Cleveland Department of Public Health remains focused on the significant issues of infant mortality, lead poisoning, and the opiate epidemic. Huge issues facing our city, our region, and country require tremendous resources and vigilant focus. The Department of Public Health, along with the crucial work of the Department of Aging, have a direct and vital presence in every corner of Cleveland. Speaking of the Department Aging, please remember that the Gunning Park Rose Center for Aging Well is an awesome resource for our area seniors. Its compassionate and dedicated staff and Board work tirelessly for our seniors at Gunning Park Recreation Center, 16700 Puritas Avenue.

With the hope of spring comes the necessity to ramp up neighborhood safety and awareness. Please call the police if something looks out of place. As previously stated, deployment of police resources remains a top priority. The calls for service are an important factor when the Command Staff determines allocation.

Please continue to shop locally and support all of the wonderful small businesses who call West Park home! Get a fish fry!!

The Old Green Barn ...by James Foos

The Tyler Barn in the "valley" on Valley Parkway of the Cleveland Metroparks is now red. Known for decades as "the old green barn" because of its color, the Metroparks recently painted it red, perhaps to make it look more like a traditional barn. There is history to the structure and the land on which it sits.

The Tyler Estate called Woodside Farm was built in 1892, by Washington S. Tyler (1835-1917) and his wife Marion Clark Tyler (1845-1934). He of Cleveland Wire Works and Tyler Elevator fame and fortune, Mr. Tyler was prominent in business, church (The Old Stone Church), and local philanthropy (hospitals and Western Reserve University). They were residents of Millionaires Row. Their home was on Euclid Avenue where the Bulkley Building now stands. Like most millionaires at the time, he wanted a summer home, a place away from the city. Mr. Tyler chose a scenic, valley side location in Rockport Township, a full day's carriage ride from Euclid Avenue.

Summer home farming was a "gentleman's hobby" for the wealthy at the time. Although perhaps a hobby for Mr. Tyler, it was a place of employment and pride for the many workers at Woodside Farm. A total farming operation, the land not only featured a mansion and pool, but also included worker homes, bull pens, greenhouses, poultry houses, or-



chards, vineyards, lily ponds, and formal flower and vegetable gardens.

Encompassing well over 200 acres, the estate property extended along the valley side of Rocky River Drive from Saint Joseph Academy on the south to Niagara Drive on the north. It included property on the east side of the Drive from Munn Road to Edgecliff Avenue. The estate remained with the family and Tyler Company into the 1940's, when it was sold for development, including Amber Drive.

Back to the barn... Starting in 1919, the Cleveland Parks Board, predecessor to the Metroparks, began purchasing or obtaining by donation, privately owned land along the Rocky River. In 1921, widow Marion Tyler donated 75 acres of the farm's valley land to the Board. That land today also includes the Tyler ball and soccer fields. Over the many years, the green barn sat empty, but remained in place. It also was used for storage of Metroparks property. In 1996, the barn suffered major damage from the falling of a large tree branch, and was slated for demolition. In 1997, Andrea Nagy, now a Metroparks retiree, in cooperation with the Metroparks and others, saved the barn from demise. The newly repaired and painted green barn was rechristened The Tyler Barn, complete with historic plaque.

When asked about the barn's color change, Cleveland Metroparks Historian Judy MacKeigan said, "As we move into our next century as a Park District, we've been careful to honor our heritage. The Tyler Barn was acquired in our beginnings and, when we worked to save it, we discovered that it has been painted several times over the last 100+ years including several different shades of green but also a darker color that may well have been red. After researching additional property owned by the Tyler Estate as well as traditional painting practices at the time, we determined that red would best pay homage to the barn's history."

There is and always has been a much bigger story behind the little green, now red, barn in the valley.

Perfect July weather, a WCPN radio spot with Amy Eddings, and the love of gardens all came together to create the 'perfect storm' for GardenWalk Cleveland (GWC) 2017, which attracted droves of curious garden-lovers for the free, two-day event. Some gardeners recorded upwards of 500+guests over the course of the weekend! We saw a record number of bike riders touring the gardens as well.

Participating neighborhoods last year were Detroit-Shoreway, North Collinwood, Slavic Village, and West Park. In 2015. West Park featured 22 beautiful gardens on the walk, and last year that number increased to 24. GWC is so appreciative of the kind and wonderful folks who open their private spaces for this event. Cleveland communities really came together! Historically, the busiest gardens are those that are in close proximity to other gardens since people like to park and walk to as many gardens as they can before driving to a new area. That is why GWC encourages participants to reach out to neighbors and block clubs to create a cluster of gardens to view in an area.

Having featured my garden on the walk, I know first hand what a truly rewarding experience it is. Visitors to my garden were pleasant to talk with, even if they offered only a smile or a "hello." They showed appreciation for the gardeners who opened up their yards to visitors and inquired about the plants and flowers.

Gardens are made for sharing. They bring people and communities together! Think afternoon tea, picnics, weddings, and restaurant patio gardens. As much as I desired to see other gardens and meet other gardeners that day, I couldn't bear to leave my own. I know other gardeners felt the same, so this year GWC is considering splitting the weekend and having some neighborhoods open on Saturday and the others on Sunday. That way all of the participating gardeners have a day to be guests at other gardens.

The neighborhoods chosen each year varies, so West Park may not be on the tour in 2019, but we do know for sure that we will be on this year: Saturday, July 7 and/or Sunday, July 8.

With assistance from the City of Cleveland's Storefront Renovation Program, Hatfield's Goode Grub, the restaurant at 16700 Lorain Avenue, has a new sign that matches the graphic design on their food truck.

The installation of landscaping in the new planter beds - most likely to occur in the spring - will mark the completion of the Storefront Renovation Program project at the HKM Building at 15708 Lorain Avenue. The new owner of the property has thoroughly renovated the building, inside and out, and has already leased one of the two storefronts.

Staff of Kamm's Corners Development Corporation (KCDC) is working with City Storefront Renovation Program staff and the owners of the Triumph Motorcycle flagship store proposed for 15101 Lorain Avenue. The opening of the store will require substantial rehabilitation of the building interior and a facelift of the building exterior with new signage.

Now that the new sign has been installed at the main entrance to the parking lot on Albers Avenue, KCDC has completed the final phase of improvements funded by a grant from Cuyahoga County. KCDC coordinated the project to make improvements and enhancements to the perimeter of the City-owned parking lot at West 168th Street and Albers Avenue. Landscaping improvements focused on the street frontages along West 168th Street and Albers Avenue.

The improvements included the removal of four trees, tree trimming, weed and shrub removal, and new top soil with grass seed. In addition, the project included the construction of a new storage shed for the Kamm's

Corners Farmers Market, KASID, and the installation of wall sconce light fixtures along the public walkway between Back Stage Bar and Walgreens.

For those of you who may have missed it, Jimmy John's Gourmet Sandwiches has opened at 17510 Lorain Avenue (immediately west of Marc's). Hours are 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. every day. Call 216-688-0500.


Women's Classic Softball League



It is one of the largest public funders for arts and culture in the nation, helping hundreds of organizations in Cuyahoga County connect millions of people to cultural experiences each year.

Cuyahoga County residents created CAC in 2006, when they approved a tax on cigarettes to support arts and culture in our community. Since 2007, CAC has invested more than \$170 million dollars in more than 375 organizations both large and small, making our community a more vibrant place to live, work, and play.



Back in November 2015, county voters overwhelmingly supported Issue 8, the penny-and-a-half tax and revenue source for CAC. The renewed tax provided ten additional years to invest in local arts and culture.

KCDC is pleased to be among the groups being funded in 2018. Our Summer Arts and Entertainment Series was awarded the full grant amount of \$5,000 in the Project Support II Grant Award Category. A total of \$1.9 million in grants went to 184 Cuyahoga County non-profits to support thousands of arts and cultural experiences in 2017.

Presenting a wide breadth of live music in styles ranging from a jug band to rock-n-roll, KCDC's Summer Arts and Entertainment Series launches with The Hooley on Kamm's Corners™ on Saturday, May 12, and continues weekly throughout the summer at our Kamm's Corners Farmers Markets every Sunday from June through October. And our monthly Asphalt Cinema in Impett Park features an art component on the third Friday in June, July, and August, where children color or create images from the featured film or design an image of their own.

Colorectal Cancer Screening Can Save Your Life.

Colorectal cancer (cancer that starts in the colon or rectum) is among the top three types of cancer in the United States, according to the American Cancer Society.

"Overall, colorectal cancer is highly preventable, and if detected early, it's also one of the most curable types of cancer," says Edmond Blades, MD, a Cleveland Clinic gastroenterologist. "Up to 85 percent of colorectal cancers could be prevented or successfully treated if colonoscopy screening recommendations were followed."

Get a Colonoscopy

The American College of Gastroenterology recommends a first colonoscopy, or colorectal cancer screening, at age 50, or sooner if you have a family history of colorectal cancer, precancerous polyps, or inflammatory bowel disease. African-American patients are advised to begin average risk screening at age 45.

"Many people are nervous about having a colonoscopy because of the prep needed to clean the colon, or they are worried about being uncomfortable during the exam," adds Dr. Blades. "Bowel prep medications have changed for the better – there's less to drink, and the taste of the 'drink' has improved."

During the procedure, patients are relaxed by conscious sedation or a "twilight" sleep, and a colonoscope (a long, flexible instrument about one-half inch in diameter) is inserted and advanced through the large intestine. As the scope is withdrawn, the entire lining of the colon and rectum is carefully inspected and polyps are removed. The procedure takes about 20 to 30 minutes.

"Although most people have no obvious symptoms, about one in five people over the age of 50 have a polyp growing inside them. If they have a colonoscopy, the polyp can usually be removed and almost eliminate their risk of getting cancer from that polyp," explains Dr. Blades.

While it's possible to have colorectal cancer and not know it, there are signs that should prompt a visit to your physician for further evaluation: blood in the stool, weight loss, changes in bowel movements, or the appearance of the stool.

Reduce Your Risk

You can also help lower your risk by making sensible lifestyle choices.

The most important thing you can do is stop smoking.

Eat a healthy diet. Limit your servings of red meat, like beef, and choose fish or chicken instead. Increase your intake of fiber, and fruits and vegetables. And try not to have more than one alcoholic drink per day.

"Maintain a healthy weight and stay active," advises Dr. Blades. "Twenty minutes of medium-level exercise daily can reduce your risk as much as 25 to 50 percent. A brisk walk, a slow bike ride, and gardening are good activities."

Treatment Options

Tremendous strides have been made in treating colorectal cancer.

In most cases, colorectal cancer is treated with surgery to remove the part of the bowel that contains the cancer. Minimally invasive surgery may be performed laparoscopically with small incisions, and often does not require an ostomy bag following the procedure.

Chemotherapy and radiation treatment may also be necessary.

"Most patients who develop colorectal cancer have no obvious symptoms or risk factors," says Dr. Blades. "That's why screening is so important and can possibly save your life."

Vocational Guidance Services Opens New Location

New to the KCDC Building is a branch of Vocational Guidance Services (VGS). VGS' mission is "Preparing People with Barriers to Employment for a Brighter Future." This highly acclaimed, successful, private, not-for-profit vocational rehabilitation agency has more than 128 years of dedicated experience serving individuals with disabilities or other barriers to employment.

Every year, VGS provides a comprehensive range of vocational rehabilitation services as well as paid "earning while learning" work opportunities to more than 3,600 individuals with physical disabilities, mental disabilities, a history of incarceration, or other barriers to employment. All VGS services are provided at no cost to the individual.

VGS' services reflect a personcentered approach that is responsive to the needs, desires, and expectations of those served.

VGS measures each person's strengths and helps them discover the competencies they need in order to accomplish their employment goals. This process includes Work Evaluation, Work Adjustment, Skills Training, Specialized Services, Job Placement, Retention Services, and Job Coaching.

Individuals from all avenues of life are referred to VGS to obtain services that will enhance their existing abilities, help them to develop new skills, and set achievable goals on the path to their brighter futures. One way this is accomplished is through VGS' "earning while learning" work opportunities; every week these opportunities enable 1,000 individuals to overcome their barriers to employment and earn a paycheck.

VGS was one of the first organizations to receive accreditation by CARF International, the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities. VGS recently received its 17th consecutive accreditation which extends to August 2018. VGS is also registered as a Proprietary School



in the State of Ohio (State Board Proprietary School Registration Certification # 79-10-0671T).

The primary VGS' service offered at 17401 Lorain Avenue is "Day Services for Senior Citizens with Developmental Disabilities."

VGS' Senior Program provides opportunities for older adults with developmental disabilities to remain active in and connected to their community. The seniors enjoy visiting the Golden Age Center located in the Gunning Park Recreational Center for coffee, exercise, crafts, and fellowship.

The Vocational Guidance Services chapter of the Red Hat Society also promotes social interaction and volunteerism. With regular trips to Freeway Lanes for bowling and on-site Tai Chi instruction with Grey Dragon, participants build their stamina and improve their balance.

The most popular community trips include lunch at George's Restaurant, selecting movies at the Lakewood Public Library, and shopping for bingo prizes, serving the dual purpose of getting outdoors and into the community while practicing social, decisionmaking, and budgeting skills.

The Marguard Shrine on Rocky River Drive ...by Gary Swilik

The 108-year-old Monastery of Poor Clares, at 3501 Rocky River Drive, sits on a beautiful lawn surrounded by shade trees. At the southwest corner of the yard, closer to the street, is a pavilion containing a painted statue of Our Lady of Lourdes. The roof of the shelter is supported by eight carved wooden pillars.

This graceful shrine originally stood almost a mile away on the grounds of the Marquard Mansion at 3260 Warren Road, the home of local builder Philip Marquard. When he passed away in 1942, it was donated to the monastery. The shrine was altered after it was moved. Originally it included only four columns and was partially enclosed by a wall.

"The Poor Clares was a favorite charity of my grandfather," says Philip's grandson Thomas A. Marquard of Dearborn, Michigan. "The shrine on Rocky River Drive is the same one that stood in his yard on Warren Road. The house and grounds had many religious statues, shrines, and artwork. Most of the large pieces were donated to various churches."

The origin of the shrine is common knowledge to the nuns who live at the monastery. "The Marquard family was an early benefactor and friend of our community," Sister Therese told the author.

The Marquard shrine, an architectural treasure. has found a safe home with the Poor Clares. Meanwhile, the future of the Marguard Mansion on Warren Road, one of the most historically significant sites in West Park, is in the hands of St. Mary's Romanian Church which bought the property in 2009.

Keep Warm and Safe with Top 10 Cold Weather Tips from the Red Cross

As temperatures remain low this winter, the American Red Cross offers ten steps people should take to stay safe during the cold weather.

- 1. Layer up! Wear layers of lightweight clothing to stay warm. Gloves and a hat will help prevent losing your body heat.
- 2. Don't forget your furry friends. Bring pets indoors. If they can't come inside, make sure they have enough shelter to keep them warm and that they can get to unfrozen water.
- 3. Remember the three feet rule. If you are using a space heater, place it on a level, hard surface and keep anything flammable at least three feet away things such as paper, clothing, bedding, curtains, or rugs.
- 4. Requires supervision Turn off space heaters and make sure fireplace embers are out before leaving the room or going to bed.
- 5. Don't catch fire! If you are using a fireplace, use a glass or metal fire screen large enough to catch sparks and rolling logs.
- 6. Protect your pipes. Run water, even at a trickle, to help prevent your pipes from freezing. Open the kitchen and bathroom cabinet doors to allow warmer air to circulate around the plumbing. Be sure to move any harmful cleaners and household chemicals out of the reach of children. Keep the garage doors closed if there are water lines in the garage.
- 7. Better safe than sorry. Keep the thermostat at the same temperature day and night. Your heating bill may be a little higher, but you could avoid a costlier repair job if your pipes freeze and burst.
- 8. The kitchen is for cooking. Never use a stove or oven to heat your home.
- 9. Use generators outside. Never operate a generator inside the home, including in the basement or garage.
- 10. Knowledge is power. Don't hook a generator up to the home's wiring. The safest thing to do is to connect the equipment you want to power directly to the outlets on the generator.

sixth nationally for the total amount of energy we use and third nationally for the amount of pollution we emit when generating electricity? Whether it's in our home or business, energy efficiency and conservation are often the most cost-effective approaches for reducing emissions and energy costs.

Remember, you can purchase renewable energy through aggregation (clevelandenergysaver.com/cityof-cleveland-aggregation-opt-out) and bring down both cost and emissions.

With spring just ahead of us, it's time to think about composting the leaves that couldn't be picked up due to snow. Composting organic material keeps it away from landfills thus reducing City of Cleveland disposal costs.

Nationally, the U.S. exports about one-third of its recycling and nearly half goes to China. For decades, China has used recyclables from around the world to supply its manufacturing boom. But last summer, China declared that this "foreign waste" includes too many non-recyclable materials that are "dirty," and even "hazardous." In a filing with the World Trade Organization, the country listed 24 kinds of solid wastes it would ban. That is leaving U.S. recycling companies scrambling to adapt.

Cleveland Waste Recycling may be challenged as a result. Take time to review city recycling guidelines to better understand what materials can be recycled. Do not bag recyclables for curbside pickup. That creates an extra step for recycling center workers. Just put them loose in the blue bin. The city is dependent on selling clean recyclables.

And finally, as we move closer to spring and summer, lower your water bills by installing a rain barrel or rain garden. This can result in a flat reduction of 25% in your bill (www.neorsd.org/about).

Did you know that our extensive West Park tree canopy puts us near the top of the Cleveland's greenest neighborhood? Let's work to make our great neighborhood even cleaner and greener.






