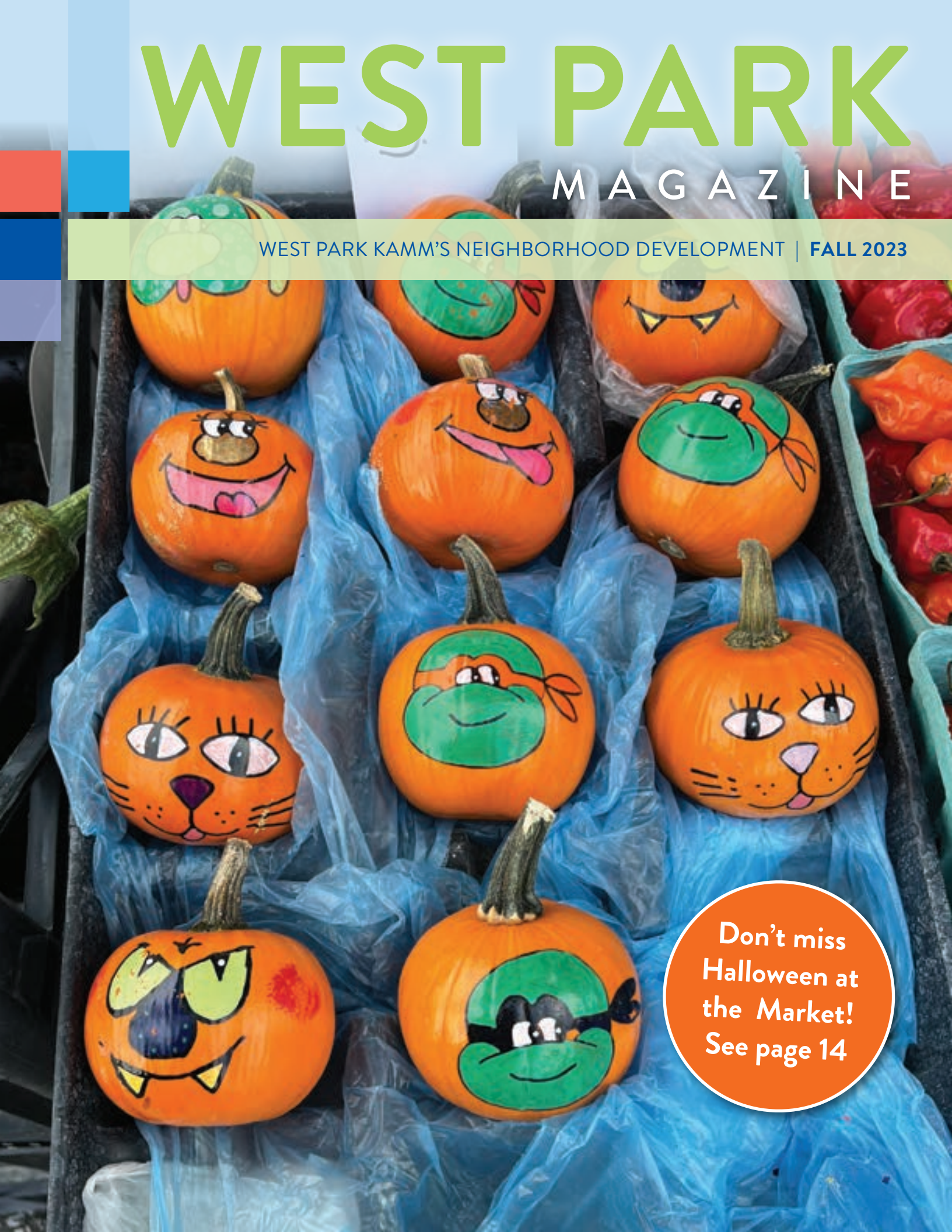

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West Park Pollinator Pathways

Cultivating Community Engagement and Biodiversity with the West Park Green Team.

The West Park Green Team is happy to share progress on the West Park Pollinator Pathways project, a community-driven effort aimed at creating a network of pollinator-friendly gardens throughout the neighborhood. Thanks to the support of a NeighborUp Action Grant, the Green Team has been able to bring this project to life and take steps towards conserving local biodiversity and supporting essential pollinators. With lots of hard work, Green Team volunteers successfully established nine pollinator gardens for free in resident lawns across the community. Those who applied and received a free garden were required to put the garden in a space with an existing grass lawn. Maintaining lawns of monoculture grass has long been a hallmark of the West Park landscape, but it comes at a cost to the

environment. While the lush green grass may look aesthetically pleasing, the ecological impact of sod can be harmful. Even the addition of a small garden withing a front lawn, can bring tremendous benefits. 15+ volunteers worked together to remove roughly 450 square feet of sod in total. Throughout this project, volunteers have played a crucial role, contributing their expertise, time, and dedication to bringing the West Park Pollinator Pathways to life. Their valuable knowledge and passion for native gardening have been instrumental in the initiative's success.

By creating these pollinator-friendly habitats, the Green Team hopes to foster a healthier ecosystem that supports a diverse range of plant and animal species. Pollinators play a pivotal role in the reproductive processes of many

plants, contributing to the production of fruits, vegetables, and seeds. Furthermore, to ensure a thriving and sustainable pollinator habitat, a variety of native plant species were carefully selected. These plants are well-adapted to the local climate and provide essential resources for pollinators. Among the species chosen for the gardens are: Little Bluestem, Swamp Milkweed, Black-Eyed Susan, Purple Coneflower, Lanceleaf Coreopsis, Blanket Flower, Blue Vervain, Partridge Pea, Upright Coneflower, Skyblue Aster, and Northern Sea Oats.

Planting native species is crucial for the overall health of the ecosystem. Native plants have co-evolved with local wildlife, including pollinators, over thousands of years, creating an intricate web of interdependence. These



plants provide the necessary nectar, pollen, and shelter for native pollinators, helping to maintain balanced and resilient ecosystems.

If you're interested in cultivating a pollinator garden in your yard, there are plenty of resources to help you get started. The Ohio State University Extension website provides a wealth of information, including recommended plants, layout, and maintenance rec-

ommendations. You also have access to knowledgeable Master Gardener volunteers who can answer your questions as they arise. To get started, visit u.osu.edu/plantbynumbers

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Franciscan Village Marches Forward with Plans for the Future

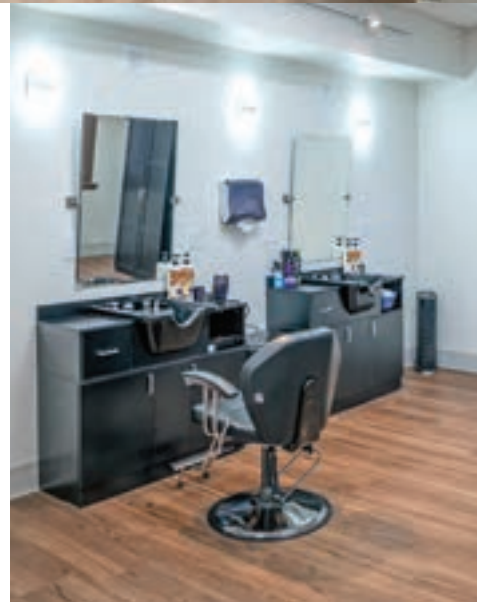
Franciscan Village, 3648 Rocky River Drive, has been offering housing for independent adults aged 62+ since the 1970s. The 176-unit residential campus is characterized by historic architecture and a serene, wooded site located next to the Cleveland Metroparks Rocky River Reservation.

Ambitious plans for the facility began several years ago. In the past year, one phase has been completed and another set of plans launched. Renovations were completed to the existing facility earlier this year and new construction plans are underway to add housing options with a construction start date slated for late this summer, representing the most substantial expansion of facility's capacity since 1995.



RENOVATIONS COMPLETED

Significant reinvestments have been completed for improvements to the apartment complex. The organizational commitment to sustainability is evident in the replacement of the lighting fix-



tures with all-new energy-efficient LED lighting, the installation of new energy-star-rated refrigerators and electric ranges in all units, and the replacement of all the existing boilers with high-efficiency boilers. To ensure accessibility

for all, walk-in showers were installed in every standard unit, and roll-in showers were installed in most accessible units. As part of the renovation, significant upgrades have been made to install new vinyl flooring throughout all corridors and units. The addition of new laminate countertops and hardwood cabinetry enhances the overall living experience for the tenants. In response

to the growing demand for accessible housing, the number of accessible units has been increased, complemented by audio/visual units catering to the hearing and visually impaired community. In addition, provisions were made for complimentary in-unit Wi-Fi access to all tenants, facilitating connectivity and convenience.

A broad array of new amenities have

been added to enhance the residents' quality of life. The recently acquired Activity Center, formerly the Rectory for Our Lady of Angels Church, has been transformed into a multifunctional space. This center now houses an on-site library, salon, computer lab, arts and crafts room, resale shop, fitness center, and therapy room. Also, the establishment of a state-of-the-art atrium and

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community room, boasting a seating capacity of more than 100, now serves as the primary venue for an extensive range of programs and events. Finally, a new walking trail on the northern side of the property has been introduced, encouraging an active and health-conscious lifestyle for tenants.

NEW CONSTRUCTION

In response to the pressing demand for affordable housing on the West Side of Cleveland, Franciscan Village has construction plans ready to build 63 units in a new four-story structure. As depicted in the rendering above, the architecture of the new building has been deliberately designed to complement the existing property, ensuring seamless integration within the Franciscan Village campus. Balconied units on the western facade will provide a captivating view of the Cleveland Metroparks valley. Earlier this year, the project design was approved by the Far West Design Review Committee and the Cleveland City



Planning Commission.

Site improvements include an expansion of the parking facilities and the existing patio area will undergo a transformation. The goal is to commence leasing in Fall 2024, subject to the construction schedule. For more information, contact Alister Englehart at (216) 941-3330 or aenglehart@franvillage.org. ■







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Laura's Home Unveils Plans to Expand to Provide Transitional Housing

Following their renovations in 2022, Laura's Home has unveiled the second phase of their expansion plan, 16 transitional housing units. These new units will expand the number of women and children that Laura's Home can serve, much needed relief for the facility which has been at or over capacity for seven years now.

Transitional housing is an important intermediary step for women who have graduated from the program, but still need the support and resources that Laura's Home provides or are struggling to find safe and affordable housing for themselves and their children. It also gives them more time to finish a degree, secure stable employment, and

ensures that their children have educational continuity. Frequent school changes often create challenges for children and families. Living on-site ensures that children are enrolled at the same school for up to three consecutive years, improving educational and emotional outcomes for those children.

The construction of the new units is expected to cost \$4 million. Laura's Home is a part of the City Mission, an organization funded entirely by private donors. With a fundraising goal of \$3.6

million, the City Mission received an answered prayer this June, when Dr. Fred and Jackie Rothstein gifted them \$1.5 million for the construction of new housing. The new development called Rothstein Village will be named after them. The groundbreaking for the new units is scheduled for November and they are expected to be ready for move-in next fall.

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Bethany English Lutheran Church and WPKND Team Up to Transform Senior's Home

Late in May, WPKND staff and Bethany English Lutheran Church's Community Engagement Team partnered up to transform the front steps of Mr. Farrel Thomas, a senior West Parker. The Community Engagement Team is a group of church members that seek out volunteer projects within the local community.

One of the leaders of that group is WPKND's very own Neighborhood Engagement Coordinator, Rebekah Ferro. Just as they were looking for a project, Mr. Thomas reached out to the WPKND housing team for some help with home repairs and maintenance. He needed assistance painting his front steps as well as help with his lawn and weeds. Although he is enrolled in our Senior Services Program, a partnership between Jefferson-Puritas, West Park



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CDC and WPKND, which helps with lawn mowing, it does not start until after Memorial Day.

Now retired, Farrel was a bus driver with a route out of the Triskett RTA station for 15 years. Like many residents aging in place, mobility issues have made it hard for him to take care of his yard and flower beds like he had in the past. To support those in need of assistance, WPKND housing staff connect residents with home maintenance-related programs and services – from seniors on a fixed income, to first-time home buyers, and everything in between.

For this project, WPKND's Senior Home Repair Grant, a grant of up to \$500 to help complete an exterior repair for an income-qualified senior, was used to support the purchase of paint and supplies. The Bethany Community Engagement Team volunteered their time and brought along lawn care equipment. With a robust and ambitious crew of volunteers, the group completed a wide range of tasks in



just four hours on a Saturday morning. They mowed the lawn, pulled weeds and tidied the garden, and trimmed hedges. The handrail and steps were scraped and painted. Volunteers collected eight large bags of yard waste from the front and back to help Ferrel restore his lovely garden and showcase large irises and roses that had been hidden by the weeds. When asked about his



experience, Farrel said, "Good work and humans are hard to come by — they were excellent!" ■



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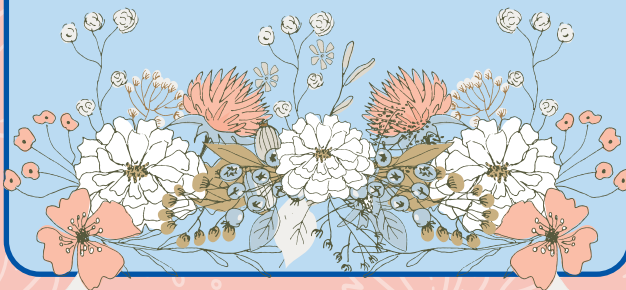

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New Plant Store Opens on Lorain Avenue

West Park Kamm's neighborhood residents are known to take pride in their neighborhood. One way that pride is manifested is in residents' approach to landscaping and gardening. Just check out shoppers at Buyers Outlet, Marc's, or Puritas Nursery for examples.

There is now a new plant shopping option in the neighborhood. Plant Bodega quietly opened in a storefront at 15724 Lorain Avenue in April. Since then, the new business has been steadily building its customer base and expanding its offerings. Ivelisse De Jesus, the shop owner, was scouting locations for her new business in Tremont and West Park Kamm's. In a recent interview, she said she was convinced that West Park Kamm's was the ideal location for her new business after visiting local restaurants and walking side streets to 5 Points Coffee and seeing our residents' display of plantings and landscaping.

Ivelisse explained that her goal is to "share her passion for plants and to make established plants more accessible to people in a neighborhood boutique setting." The word is getting out quickly as she is seeing local customers in her store as well as those from as far afield as Lorain and Medina. The store's plant offerings focus on indoor plants including rare and common varieties as well as cacti and air plants (which do not require soil to grow).

To supplement the store's live plant offerings, plant accessories are available including house plant mix from Rust Belt Riders, plant food, plant potholders, and gift items such as soy candles and coffee mugs. Please pay a visit to the store or to the Kamm's Corners Farmers Market on Sundays from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. from now until mid-October where Plant Bodega is a periodic vendor. Sign up for our weekly Kamm's Corners Farmers Market newsletter to stay up to date on which vendors will be attending each week at bit.ly/kcfmnewssignup. Plant Bodega's hours of operation are Wednesdays 11:00 a.m.–4:00 p.m., Thursdays 11:00 a.m.–6:00 p.m., and Fridays and Saturdays 11:00 a.m.–5:00 p.m. As the business continues to grow, store hours will be expanded. 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Original Steaks & Hoagies Now Open in Warren Village Shopping Center

Rich Lane is very familiar with the West Park Kamm's area. He was raised in the neighborhood and attended St. Mark School and then St. Edward High School. During his childhood, Rich has vivid memories of frequent trips to Warren Village to buy candy before going to Impett Park. Flash forward to the present, Rich, with his wife and co-owner, Dawn Coe, opened Original Steaks & Hoagies at 3362 Warren Road in June.

Rich said, "The tight knit community of West Park was the main reason my wife and I decided to open our first location here, and it just so happened there was a vacant former Subway store in this perfect spot," Rich said. (For reference, the location is adjacent to K&K Portage Market.)

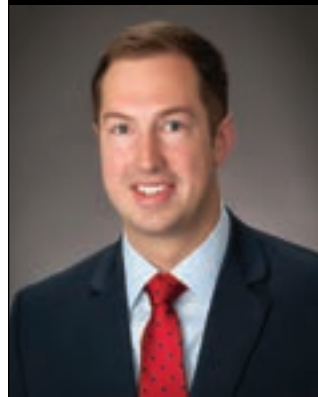
The goal of Original Cheesesteaks & Hoagies is to offer customers the highest quality cheesesteaks. Cooked to order with fresh ingredients, shaved 100% ribeye steak is coupled with provolone cheese and placed on Amoroso rolls that are the same brand used in Philadelphia. For those who don't want a roll, customers can have a honey wheat wrap or a bowl with Romaine lettuce instead. For those who don't want steak, fresh chicken—sliced, fingers, or boneless wings—are available. In addition, flash-fried cauliflower can be ordered as a vegetarian option.

The menu also offers sides for the sandwiches. Their best sellers are the fresh-cut fries and beer-battered fries. The tater tots, homemade from hash browns, have varieties to choose from: traditional tater tots with [cheese] whiz, bacon, and cheese for the loaded tot, buffalo sauce for the buffalo tot, and pepperoni and marinara for the pizza tot.

All menu items are prepared at the time they are ordered. According to Rich, "the reception from the community has been amazing." From the day they opened they saw success, with a line of customers waiting outside the door starting at 8:00 a.m. He said business has remained consistent and strong ever since. The hours of operation are Monday-Thursday 10:30 a.m.–9:00 p.m., Friday & Saturday 10:30 a.m.–10:00 p.m., and Sunday 10:30 a.m.–8:00 p.m. You can find them on Door Dash, Uber Eats, Grub Hub or order online at steaksandhoagies.com/westpark. ■

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West Park Receives Tree Grant

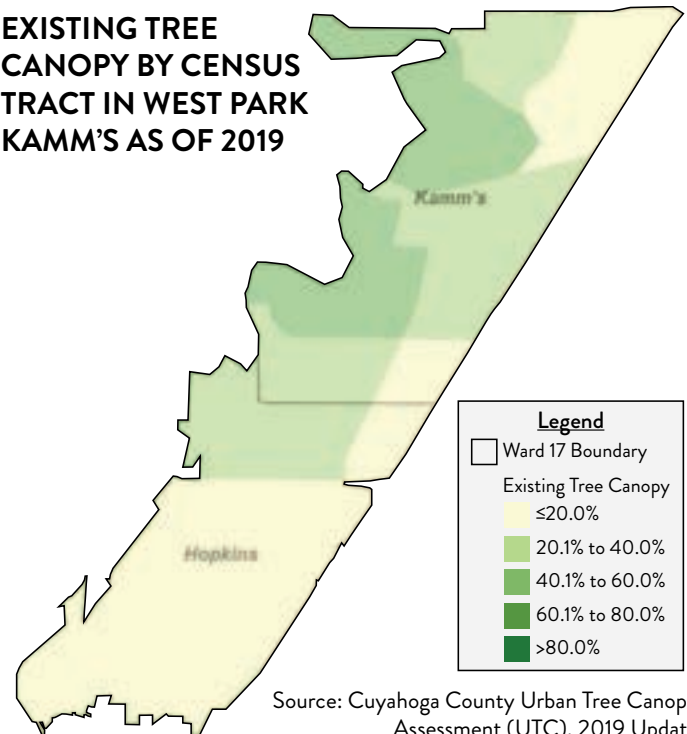

West Park Kamm's Neighborhood Development (WPKND) is honored to receive funds for tree planting in Ward 17. This project is supported in part by the residents of Cuyahoga County through a public grant from the Cuyahoga County Healthy Urban Tree Canopy Grant Program. HUTC is a competitive grant program to promote a healthy tree canopy with funds for planting and maintenance. WPKND is one of 19 grantees this year, and this support will allow us to reach a goal of planting 75 new trees and maintaining them for the critical first years.

The majority of the tree plantings will be done in collaboration with the Cuyahoga Metropolitan Housing Authority at Riverside Park, with some trees also intended to be planted on the neighboring streets. The addition of new trees in this region of the neighborhood will provide a host of benefits, helping to decrease its high climate vulnerability. Not only do trees provide an environmental boost in the way they capture carbon, stormwater run-off, and provide vegetation and homes for wildlife, trees also provide shade and beauty which in turn improves both physical and mental health.

Education about the importance and benefit of urban trees will also be provided through workshops and community planting days this fall. WPKND is excited to play a part in expanding our city's canopy and making West Park a cooler, cleaner, and greener neighborhood. ■

West Park Kamm's Neighborhood Development (WPKND) is excited to announce that we have received a grant to launch a public art program in Ward 17. The program will allow us to fund several murals throughout the neighborhood, instilling fun, beauty, and community pride along some of our busy commercial streets. To help inform the artwork and ensure it represents the community, we hosted a series of visioning activities this summer to hear from residents.

At events like our Pop-Ups in the Parks, Kamm's Corners Farmers Market, and other public gatherings, WPKND staff led community visioning exercises to learn about West Parkers' favorite places to go and things to do, as well as what makes this neighborhood and its

Homestead Water/ Sewer Discount*	Secure a lower fixed charge and consumption rate for seniors and/or permanent disabled individuals.
Senior Service Program (Ward 16 & 17)*	Schedule services such as gutter cleaning and lawn care for senior and disabled residents.
Water Affordability Program*	Offers a 40% discount on all standard water charges.
Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP)*	HEAP assists eligible low-income residents with their winter home heating costs using natural gas, electric, oil, kerosene, or wood.
Lead Hazard Control Program (LHC)	Provides lead risk assessments, identifies lead-based paint and provides grants to control lead-based paint hazards.

Cleveland Restoration Society (CRS)	A low-interest (under 2%), fixed-rate, equity-based loan for maintaining & improving homes 50+ years. Interior & exterior projects qualify. Plus, free technical assistance on questions related to home conditions or repair.
Housing Enhancement Loan Program (HELP)	Provides home improvement loans, at 3% points below normal bank rates, for homeowners. No restrictions on a borrower's income and few limitations on what improvements can be made to a property.
West Park Sherwin-Williams Paint Program	Discounts on paint and painting supplies. All those living in Ward 17 are eligible. Limit one per household.
Senior Home Repair*	Small exterior repair grants of up to \$500 for seniors and adults with disabilities. Grants and grant size are income-qualifying.
CHN Energy Efficiency Services*	Services include insulation, LED bulb installation, and Energy Star refrigeration replacement.
Contractor List	Looking for help with a project at home? WPKND has a list of local contractors and tips for hiring one.
Cleveland Exterior Paint Program*	Provides free vouchers for paint and supplies to Cleveland homeowner-occupants and renters to paint the exterior of their house.
Senior Homeowner Assistance Program (SHAP)*	Grant available to low-income senior/disabled homeowners with houses in need of health, safety, and maintenance repairs such as roofs, porches, ramps, electrical or plumbing work.
Age-Friendly Home Improvement Program (AFHIP)*	Program for seniors/disabled homeowners to address critical home repair or maintenance projects.

New Investments in Recreation Facilities *by Councilman Charles Slife*

Seeking better city services and amenities for their growing community, residents of West Park Village voted to be annexed into the City of Cleveland over one hundred years ago. Over the last century, our neighborhood has certainly grown and flourished. As council member for Ward 17, I recognize the need for Cleveland to continually reinvest in our neighborhood to ensure that the coming century is as strong as the last.

This includes our neighborhood parks and recreation center. A \$2.5-million contract has been awarded to fully rebuild the closed pool at Gunning Recreation Center and efforts are underway to quickly identify additional funds to further leverage \$0.75 million that have been set aside for a new playground at Impett Park.

Keeping our neighborhood strong is about more than just city-owned assets. It is ensuring that spaces are available for new businesses to open and that we are attracting and retaining residents. To that end, I am proud to have sponsored legislation, passed by Cleveland City Council, that makes available \$10 million to improve commercial corridors and rehabilitate homes, down to the studs and with modern features. This work will be done specifically in middle-class neighborhoods like West Park, which can get lost in the mix and overlooked, despite being stable with strong tax bases. This legislation is a significant step forward for the city and shows an acknowledgment of what we all know: that places like Ward 17 need and deserve investment. ■

Specialized treatment for abnormal heart rhythms.

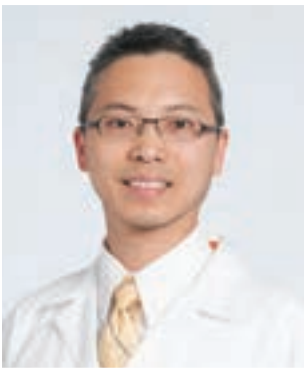
Thanks to its electrical system, your heart beats in an orderly and efficient way, circulating blood to your body. When something goes wrong with those electrical impulses, you may have an arrhythmia or abnormal heart rhythm.

"In some arrhythmias, the heart may beat too fast. In others, it may not beat in a regular pattern," says Christine Tanaka-Esposito, MD, a Cleveland Clinic Fairview Hospital cardiologist who specializes in electrophysiology – the specialized diagnosis and treatment of abnormal heart rhythms. "Testing and diagnosis can identify why there is an irregular rhythm, the type of arrhythmia and if it is a harmless or dangerous one."

One of the most common arrhythmias is atrial fibrillation (Afib), an irregular and rapid heart rhythm that leads to symptoms including fatigue, heart palpitations, trouble breathing and dizziness.

"Consulting an electrophysiologist can help pinpoint your issue and, if needed, determine the right treatment," says Roy Chung, MD, another electrophysiologist who treats patients at Cleveland Clinic Fairview Hospital. "There are a variety of therapeutic options available, from medication combinations tailored to individual patients, or ablation to help restore normal heart rhythms."

If your child ever needs surgery, it's comforting to know that surgery and recovery may take place at Fairview Hospital, where Cleveland Clinic Children's surgeons and specialists treat anatomic conditions, injuries and diseases unique to infants, children or adolescents.

Soon, the opening of a 4-bed intermediate care unit will make overnight stays following surgery a reality at Fairview.

"Many pediatric surgeries are done on an outpatient basis with the child going home the same day, but in some cases, overnight monitoring is needed. In the past, we transferred those children to main campus," says Jalal Abu-Shaweesh, MD, a neonatologist who also serves as the chair

of pediatrics at Fairview. "The intermediate care unit will allow as many as 50 percent of children who were previously transferred to remain at Fairview."

Along with post-surgery care, the intermediate care unit will allow for more frequent monitoring of vital signs and nursing intervention for children with medically complex conditions.

"It will enhance the level of pediatric services and allow us to do more elective surgeries at Fairview," adds Dr. Abu-Shaweesh.
