




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DEAR NEIGHBORS



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Horizon is Helping Westropp Students Learn, Explore, and be the Best They Can Be By Rebekah Ferro

n the Fall 2022 issue of the West Park Magazine, WPKND announced that we had been awarded a 21st Century Community Learning Grant in partnership with Horizon Education Centers. This five-year grant has funded an after-school and summer program for students at Clara E Westropp for the last two years. The program currently has sixty-four students who come to the after-school program, which covers a multitude of programming and subjects including math, reading and literacy, social and emotional skills, leadership skills, and the arts. Students are given access to tutoring, field trips, an after-school snack, and engaging programming through the various partners of the after-school program.

Partnerships with outside organizations provide new learning opportunities and experiences for the students. Common Ground offers social and emotional learning skills through games, sessions, and conversations. Students learn how to cooperate, share their emotions in a healthy and meaning-

ful way, and grow to be better version of themselves. Effective Leadership Academy teaches students skills such as time management, public speaking, goal setting, and problem solving with the goal to help them succeed in their future academic careers and beyond. Daily Dose of Reading provides the younger students with an intensive early literacy program where reading, singing, activities, and play are all used for pre-literacy skill training. Students are given books to take home along with accompanying activities for parents and students to complete together. Art House teaches self-exploration and expression through the arts. Students are encouraged to use their imagination to create, make connections, and explore the world around them. From making bracelets to creating new creatures from their imaginations, Art House allows students to experience the world around them through the lens of art.

On top of the partnerships and tutoring to assist students with what they learn throughout the school day, this program also allows opportunities for the teachers and tutors to fill gaps in learning they may come across. Since the curriculum is flexible, spontaneous curiosities can lead to new topics for learning. Recently, Site Coordinator Erin Joyce noticed the students did not know much about the solar system and







planets. This led to lessons about space and the planets, and even a field trip to the planetarium. The student learning experience is focused on what their educational needs are, what their interests are, and what will inspire them to continue learning.

Families are also encouraged to get involved with the 21st Century Community Learning Center program through family nights which occur once a month. These family nights cover different topics for both students and parents, including high school enrollment options through high school fairs and financial literacy. They also promote family togetherness and having fun through game nights and other activities the whole family can enjoy. These family nights also encourage parents to take an active role in their child's education and offer an opportunity for families to learn together.

The 21st Century Community Learning Center Program continues to connect the students at Clara E Westropp with tools and programming that will

Remember, until the asphalt plants reopen (normally in April,) crews use a temporary cold patch. In other words, potholes may reappear until permanent asphalt is available.

CIFF48 Sources Local Artist to Craft Filmmaker Awards

ach year the Cleveland International Film Festival commissions a local artist to create the Festival's coveted Filmmaker Awards. Locally designed and produced, the more than 30 awards going to filmmakers from around the world are a representation of the wealth of talent in the Ohio arts community. CIFF is delighted to announce this year's Award Artist is R.C. Sanford of Sankora Studios.

A woodworker with a love of art, glass, architecture, and nature, R.C. began his woodworking career in the mountains of Colorado, where he amassed skills from hand hewing timbers to precision cabinetry. After years of custom woodworking across the United States. he returned to Ohio where he focused on his illuminated designs, taking the leap into full-time artist, designer, and

craftsman. He formed Sankora Studios along with his wife, Trisha Sikora, who assists with finish and glass. Together they design and create lamps and window decor, exhibiting at some of the country's top art festivals.

"Combining wood and art glass requires attention to detail at every step, from the selection of locally sourced hardwoods to the milling and finishing of the piece. The filmmakers selected by the 48th Cleveland International Film Festival produce the highest quality and most evocative films of the time. I am honored to have been chosen to create the Filmmaker Award, and aim to provide the highest quality craftsmanship to reflect their excellence," R.C. explains. Filmmaker Awards will be presented throughout the Festival and as part of the Closing Night Ceremony, taking place on Saturday, April 13, 2024.

CIFF48 will take place April 3-13, 2024 at Playhouse Square, followed by CIFF48 Streams, sponsored by PNC, which will take place April 14-21, 2024 online. The full Festival lineup will be announced on Friday, March 8, 2024. Tickets go on sale to CIFF members on Friday, March 15, 2024 and to the public on Friday, March 22, 2024. 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Impett Park Gets a New Playground By Emily Pikturna

riends of Impett Park (FOIP) has been hard at work! Through extensive conversations with residents and frequent park users, a common sentiment emerged - dissatisfaction with the current state of the park due to deferred maintenance and outdated amenities. Seeking solutions, Friends of Impett Park engaged with local stakeholders, including Cleveland City Councilman Charles Slife, WPKND, and the Mayor's Office of Capital Proj-

ects to outline their vision for enhancing the park. Following these discussions, a significant development unfolded in the summer of 2023 when Councilman Slife secured \$750K in ARPA funds for the creation of a new playground at Impett Park. FOIP then got to work on engaging residents in the process as they believe community input and participation should drive the design. The goal is to create a unique and multi-faceted design that is

on par with playgrounds in neighboring suburbs. The design decisions were also informed by parents of children with disabilities, pediatric occupational therapists, and intervention specialists. This collaborative approach ensured that the playground design aligns with the wants and needs of the community.

The envisioned playground will feature two distinct structures catering to different age groups - one designed for 2-12-year-olds and another for 5-12 year-olds. The array of new amenities includes slides. climbing swings, apparatuses, spinning elements, a warp wall, zipline, sensory elements, and nature-inspired play features. To enhance accessibility and inclusivity for families with disabilities, the existing surface will be replaced with rubberized soft flooring. It is important to note, however, that the allocated funding has limitations. Certain elements, such as splash

pads or water features, fitness courses, playing fields, and walking trails, fall outside the scope of this project and cannot be funded through ARPA funds.

These plans mark the initial phase of FOIP's broader vision for long-term improvements across all domains of Impett Park. For example, the existing pavilion will be demolished to make way for the new playground, and FOIP is actively exploring alternative funding opportunities for a new pavilion in collaboration with the City of Cleveland. In late 2023, FOIP met with key figures, including Director of MOCAP James DeRosa, Parks & Recreation Planning Manager Jay Rauschenbach, and Landscape Architect Jim McKnight. This collaborative effort aimed to secure supplementary state funding grants for renovations beyond the scope of the ARPA playground funding. This includes funding for a new pavilion and safety fencing around the playground.

Construction on the playground is scheduled to begin in the Spring and be completed by Late-Summer 2024. To encourage ongoing community involvement in the design and planning process, FOIP invites interested individuals to join their Spring Meetings, scheduled for the third Thursday of the month at 6:30 PM starting February 15th at the St. Mark Community Room.

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Meet Linda McKenzie: A Force for Community Change

eet Linda McKenzie, a resident of West Park since August of 1990. Linda grew up in South Lorain, Ohio, and remembers fondly the community, people, and everything she loved growing up there. Everybody knew each other in her neighborhood, and everyone helped everyone. She loved the diversity, friendliness, and how her community was like a close-knit family. She met her husband, Allan, while they were both working in the Parks and Recreation Department in Lorain. Linda remembers working with kids in the park and how much she loved it. This is where she began to grow her people skills. She keeps

in contact and meets with her friends

from South Lorain to this day, and

West Park is where she now works to continue that spirit of community she learned from her mother, neighbors, and friends growing up.

Linda and her husband Allan moved

into their house on W 168th Street in August of 1990. Allan went to culinary school at Carnagie Mellon University and worked as a sous chef at Great Lakes Brewery. Linda went to school for Safety and Protective Services and has worked security at a myriad of places including Higbee's, Continental Cable, PNC Bank, Cleveland Clinic, and the Federal Building in Downtown Cleveland. She remembers her time at the PNC Bank on W 150th Street fondly. In her role, she would monitor security for PNC branches all over the country and catch people trying to

rob branches, or even employees who forgot to lock the safe at the end of the day. Every position she had strengthened her customer service skills. Her



jobs were, and still are, all fun positions that connected her to the community. She currently works security at the Cleveland Public Library. She has worked at the Rice, Harvard-Lee, and the South Brooklyn Branch, but now is at the Louis Stokes Branch, although you can sometimes find her at any branch depending on the day.

One thing that Linda works for every day, is her community. As one of the first people of color to move onto W 168th Street, she and her husband faced challenges being accepted in her neighborhood. Remembering her upbringing in South Lorain, she swore she never wanted anyone else on her street to feel unwelcome. Now, every time someone new moves in. Linda introduces herself to them, offers a warm welcome, and helps connect them to their neighborhood. She also sends a Christmas card to everyone on her street every year. She loves to walk her dog around the neighborhood and talk to her neighbors. Not everyone around her may know her

name, but she says they usually know her as "Biscuit's Mom." As the years have gone by, Linda is happy to see West Park grow into a more diverse neighborhood. She says, "I am happy to be in a place now that is like where I grew up."

Outside of work, Linda likes to travel, play racquetball, go to a Jazzercize class at Gunning Rec Center, and get out and walk her dog in the neighborhood and the Rocky River Reservation. She also loves music, tending to her garden, and serving her community. She currently serves as an elected member of the Executive Committee for Ward 17, Precinct L for the Cuyahoga County Democratic Party. She has always enjoyed getting out into her neighborhood and getting people involved in making their community a better place and learned that's exactly what a Precinct Person does. She was appointed to the Board of Directors for West Park Kamm's Neighborhood Development in 2023. She had gotten connected to WPKND when she utilized our Senior Home Repair Program to help her get a new roof in 2021. She accepted the position because she saw it as an opportunity to get "out of (her) box" and do something different to help her community. Her goal as a board member is to be present and get people to show up and get involved. She hopes that if people who look like her see her at community events, meetings, and other neighborhood happenings, it will encourage them to get more involved in their community as well.

Linda loves her community and works hard to connect with the people in it. She loves to help others and get involved wherever she can. Her hopes for West Park are that it continues to grow, become more diverse, and be a place where everyone can feel welcome and connected. She hopes more people in West Park will get involved in their community and continue to work to make West Park a strong neighborhood. Linda works to make West Park the best it can be, and we appreciate her for everything she does.

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JOIN IN THE FUN

New Townhome Development Coming to Warren Road By Joe Dill

oon, a new community will begin to take shape along Warren Road. Later this year, Maverick Building Co. will break ground on an infill development of nineteen townhomes just south of St. Mary's Romanian Orthodox Church. The project will have a private drive off Warren Road and abut the backyards of homes along West 153rd Street and Montrose Avenue.

Units will range in size from three to four-bedroom, two-and-a-half-bathroom suites with individual garages on the first floor of each townhome. In addition to the garage, each townhome will also feature a bonus room on the first floor that could serve as a bedroom. On the second floor, an open-concept kitchen, dining room, and living room will fill the space, as well as a private powder room. The third-floor accounts for the remaining bedrooms and two bathrooms.



Outside, each unit will have a small. landscaped front yard and a private patio and green space in the rear. Special attention was paid to other homes in the neighborhood when it came to selecting exterior finishes. A mix of brick, vinyl siding, and board and batten in shades of beige and bronze will combine to create a façade intended to blend into neighboring properties.

The new private drive will also be lined with street trees in the front of each home with several larger species of trees scattered along the property lines. There is currently a mix of invasive tree species and aging/unsafe trees

on the property that will need to be removed, however, the number of new trees planted will exceed those that must be taken down. Additional landscaping compromised of native plants will provide color and interest throughout the year.

Another feature of the site will be a retention pond in the northwest corner. During instances of heavy rainfall, the retention pond will fill with excess water to lessen the chance of flooding to the development and neighboring properties. Throughout most of the year, it will look like a depression in the ground, but it will serve a very important purpose during the rainy season. The pond will be fenced in for safety.

Each townhome will be individually metered for utilities, though for the time being the development will be market-rate rental units. The properties will add a unique product to West Park's rental market that the development team believes will attract young professionals and families who want to call West Park home but cannot find the right house for them yet or are not ready to commit to homeownership.

The construction team behind the project, Maverick Building Co., is an experienced home builder. Based in Avon, Maverick Building Co. has worked throughout the region on new home builds, remodels, and renovations. Young Design Studio of Lakewood is the architect for the project. The team's current timeline has them breaking ground on the project in late summer/ early fall of 2024.

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Dr. Costin explains issues that may require surgery:

J. Eduardo Corso, MD, a vascular surgeon at Cleveland Clinic Fairview Hospital and the West Valley Medical Building, recently performed the first percutaneous transmural arterial bypass (PTAB) at Fairview Hospital.

A PTAB is a procedure that is similar to what would be done with an open leg bypass from the groin to the knee area with a fabric lined graft without making incisions in the leg. The PTAB procedure uses fabric lined or covered stents (stent graft) to get blood and oxygen around a blocked artery in the thigh to the lower leg and foot.

It involves making a needle stick in the opposite groin as well as in the vein of the calf on the side of the blockage and tunneling stent grafts around the blockage using extra room in the thigh vein as a natural tunnel.

The procedure takes about two hours, the patient can go home the next day, and the patient can resume normal activity in about a day.

"The percutaneous transmural arterial bypass is a technological advance in peripheral

vascular surgery. It represents something not only novel, but akin to the laparoscopic surgery advancements that changed general surgery over the last 20+ years," says Dr. Corso.

Dr. Corso says ideal percutaneous leg bypass patients include those with:

- Long length of blockages in the thigh arteries.
- · Very heavy calcium inside their blockages.
- Appropriate room inside the vein to accommodate stents while still allowing venous return and appropriate targets for the stents at both ends.
- Prior failed stenting procedures.

"I'm honored to bring the latest in vascular surgery to the Fairview Hospital community," says Dr. Corso.

Apelt Resident Works With Bike Cleveland to Improve Pedestrian Safety by Molly Crawford

n 2013 when Matt Whisenhunt and his wife Carrie bought their home on Apelt Avenue, he didn't think about the street all that much. Matt, who is the Programs Director for Harbor and Bridge Community Center as well as a Pastor at the United Methodist Church that houses the Center, had grown up in Parma, and Carrie, who works as a Secretary at University Hospitals, had been raised in Bedford. The main impetus for moving to West Park was that it was a central location, a compromise for their far-east and far-west families. The young family moved in and quickly settled into their new neighborhood, expanding their family to four children along the way.

The street didn't become an issue for Matt and his family until 2020 when the outbreak of COVID-19 caused everyone to hunker down in their homes. By the summer of that year, with warmer temperatures and school out of session, the neighborhood kids began to congregate outside. "They had what I like to look at as a classic summer outside, riding bikes, playing games, they just did everything outside for hours. They move around the neighborhood like an amoeba." Matt explained. "Eventually, they started to spill into the street, not to be dangerous, but because to them, it is just more area to play. And it was hard to tell them no for certain things that did require some street play, but the hard part became constantly monitoring the traffic."

At the same time that he was facing these issues, Matt found a growing interest in urbanism. "I started to read articles and books about well-built cities and building good communities, just taking an interest. I found this world where people place a high value on walking and biking, not for fun's sake. But because building communities that prioritize the livability of people and

not cars is a vastly different community to live in."

These two forces in Matt's life collided in the summer of 2022, when after two summers of lockdowns and working diligently with other parents on his street to ensure the safety of their children, Matt decided something needed to be done. "I remember when riding and walking around our neighborhood, there were several locations where people hung up signs that would say, slow kids at play, so there was a desire for change," Matt recalled. He quickly connected with Bike Cleveland, a non-profit organization dedicated to making streets safer and more equitable for the communities that surround them. "We just started talking, and pretty quickly we realized that painted crosswalks and some curb extensions were right for the area. Bike Cleveland walked us through what this would look like, the agencies we need to talk to, the forms we need to fill out for the city, all of that. And then they connected us with a designer at the Kent State Urban Design Collaborative who did some renderings. Then I started canvassing with the renderings to get feedback, once in January and again in March. I kept some neighbors in the loop over email, but it was the kids that helped me to flyer." This all culminated in a chalking event that took place in early summer 2023. Neighbors were invited out to draw their own designs in the crosswalks that were to be painted and explore what they could look like.

Concurrently, Bike Cleveland, who sponsored the project, was doing their own research on the area. They conducted pedestrians counts at the intersections where installations were slated to happen and also counted how many cars fully stopped at the stop sign and how many made a rolling stop. The results showed a high number of drivers were not completely stopping, making the chances for collision with a pedestrian or cyclist higher. The fact that the installations are near Clara E Westropp Elementary School was

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also important for the organization. Jenna Thomas, Advocacy and Policy Organizer for Bike Cleveland, explained, "This was our first summer doing these kinds of street painting projects, so at the time, we were following the lead of passionate residents who wanted to do some kind of installation in their neighborhood. We knew we wanted to prioritize locations near parks and schools, and we really were trying to just highlight pedestrian spaces and pedestrian's right to space, especially kids."

Finally, in October 2023 the crosswalks were painted and the curb extensions were installed. Bike Cleveland. who sponsored the project, helped to organize a group of dedicated volunteers who did the work. The project took two days to install and will last for about a year. So far, Matt has been pleased with the results, "I feel a little bit better letting [my kids] go without being constantly watched." However, the project has not been without those who are off put by the change. "When-



ever you make changes to the roadway, there's some kind of pushback. People struggle with change, and we live in such a car-centric society that people have a hard time giving up space to people on bikes and people walking. We ran into some of that, but there are a lot of people that are really excited to have improved safety in their neighborhood, as well as some public art," Jenna explained.

The project is temporary and is expected to stay up for a year. If you are a resident with an interest in discussing how residents can lead change such as this in their neighborhoods, join the West Park Better Streets group. The next meeting is on Monday, March 11 from 6-7 p.m. at the WPKND offices at 17407 Lorain Avenue (enter in the back under the blue awning).


their staff have been glad to be a part the community for the last few years and are looking forward to growing their presence in West Park with their expanded services.

1. Inspect Your Roof

Don't forget the windows to remove dirt and grime accumulated throughout the winter months.

4. Clean Air Conditioner

Also replace the air filter. Clear any weeds or debris that may have accumulated by your compressor.

5. Clean Dryer Vent

First, unplug the dryer. Then remove the vent hose and with a vacuum, clean any lint buildup or debris. This will help improve efficiency and reduce fire hazard.

6. Check Foundation

Look for any cracking that may have developed over the winter months.

7. Test Smoke Detector

And your carbon monoxide detector. Also replace the batteries for safety.

rguably one of the most popular days the spring brings to West Park Kamm's is St. Patrick's Day. Celebrated across the city, St. Patrick's Day and Irish heritage have a long history in Cleveland, specifically in the West Park Kamm's neighborhood. Stepping off for its one hundred and eighty-second time this year, the St. Patrick's Day parade in downtown Cleveland has become the centerpiece of the holiday. The parade regularly features more than ten thousand participants along a route lined by hundreds of thousands of spectators.

Following the parade, revelers descend upon Cleveland's neighborhoods to continue the festivities. With its strong Irish community and many local hotspots that highlight Irish culture, West Park Kamm's is a popular place to spend the holiday.

However, West Park Kamm's history with the Irish community extends beyond the holiday. Irish settlers began to settle in Cleveland in large numbers around the mid-1840s during the Potato Famine in Ireland. A community centered around faith, in 1848 Irish settlers founded one of the oldest parishes in the Cleveland Catholic Diocese, Saint Patrick Church West Park on Rocky River Drive. By 1870, the Irish community accounted for roughly ten percent of Cleveland's population. Four decades later in 1910, St. Patrick's Day was formally recognized as an official holiday in the state of Ohio thanks to a bill introduced by then State Senator Dan Mooney.

Irish heritage remains just as vibrant in West Park Kamm's to this day, and as everyone gets ready to celebrate St. Patrick's Day this year, we wanted to share some of our favorite photos from years past around the neighborhood. For the last few years, Farm Dog Fresh has been using Five Points Café as a place to do pop-up shops on the weekend. In Studio West Park, though, Farm Dog Fresh will find a more permanent home. Riley and Grace plan to utilize the space on weekend mornings during the growing season as a space for Farm Dog Fresh and then schedule

Additionally, they plan to host monthly craft events in the space to round out Studio West Park's calendar of offerings. In the past, they have hosted seasonal workshops like wreath-making classes around the holidays and will expand those offerings in their new space. Studio West Park will have a soft opening on March 17th to welcome ev-

Two Grants Allow WPKND to Improve Tree Canopy in West Park By Emily Pikturna

developments are underway in West Park, where a significant initiative to enhance the neighborhood's green space is taking root. At Cuyahoga Metropolitan Hous-

ing Authority's (CMHA) Riverside Park, located on Ward 17's southern edge, fifty-five trees have been recently planted. The primary objective of this endeavor is to rejuvenate the tree canopy, providing essential shading for sidewalks and homes.

The project's next phase targets private lawns surrounding Clara E Westropp Elementary School. Through careful assessment, we identified an area lacking adequate tree canopy coverage. Homeowners and renters residing on Ponciana, Flamingo, Ferncliffe, Fairville, W. 183, and W. 185 are encouraged to complete the interest form for a chance at receiving a complimentary tree installation in their yard, complete with consultation and maintenance assistance.

In tandem with these efforts, we are recruiting individuals to join the ranks of West Park Tree Stewards. These stewards will play a crucial role as the maintenance team for CMHA trees, extending their services to community assistance, participating in outreach programs, and undergoing specialized tree-related training.

Adding to the momentum, our collaboration with the First Energy Tree Program has yielded a generous donation of 100 trees for residents of Ward 16 & 17. Among these, 25 Red Oak, 25 Syca-

more, and 50 Flowering Dogwood trees are available, each accompanied by stakes and trunk covers. The North-

ern Red Oak, a robust species adaptable to various soil conditions, can reach heights of 50-75 feet at maturity. Sycamores, known for their low-maintenance and fast-growing nature, offer substantial shade, growing up to 70 feet tall and 50 feet wide. The Flowering Dogwood, a smaller yet visually striking tree, matures at 20-40 feet and is ideal for locations with existing large trees.

Beyond the aesthetic benefits, studies suggest that planting a tree in the front yard can increase home value by 3-15%. Additionally, trees providing shade contribute to reduced energy consumption, lowering utility bills. Moreover, by supporting local biodiversity and creating habitats for birds, insects, and wildlife. residents actively contribute to the ecological balance. The positive impact extends to mental health and well-being, as green spaces with trees are linked to improved overall life satisfaction.

WPKND Says Goodbye to Executive Director, Rosemary Mudry By Joe Dill

ast December, WPKND staff said goodbye to outgoing Executive Director, Rosemary Mudry. Rosemary ioined the team at WPKND in the fall of 2019 and helped guide the organization and neighborhood through many years of growth and success. While accounting for all she achieved in her tenure in one article would prove difficult, we wanted to highlight some of her key accomplishments from the last four years.

On the economic development front, several projects were completed around the neighborhood thanks to Rosemary's support. Most notably, the long-vacant KMart site now known as the West Park Shopping Center at the corner of West 150th and Lorain is once again a bustling shopping center with a great mix of retail, grocery, and food options for the neighborhood.

Rosemary also helped WPKND expand the services we can provide to residents, most notably through a partnership formed with the McGregor Foundation. Through the McGregor Foundation's support, WPKND was able to double the number of seniors we can assist through our Senior Home Repair Program. Additionally, through a grant with the Ohio Department of Education, WPKND was able to establish a free afterschool program for students at the Horizon Academy. The program was funded for five years beginning in 2022.

Infrastructure projects currently in the works will be implemented in the future, but Rosemary will share some of the credit once they are completed. Soon, a new connector trail from Riveredge Road along Old Lorain will provide a pedestrian pathway for residents to



access Little Met Golf Course and beyond to the Rocky River Reservation.

While all the above referenced projects and achievements took a team of people to make them a reality, Rosemary's knowledge, stewardship, and advocacy for the neighborhood played a key role in each.

Rosemary left WPKND to become the inaugural Executive Director of the newly formed nonprofit Cleveland Public Market Corporation (CPMC). While we will miss her around the WPKND office, our staff and Board of Directors wish Rosemary all the best in her future and thank her for everything she did for West Park Kamm's.

Owning a business is hard work, and WP-KND provides soup-to-nuts assistance for both existing businesses and those looking to make our neighborhood home. WPKND also focuses our work on guiding and supporting large-scale real

estate development and facilitating neighborhood infrastructure and planning projects that create better public spaces like the Old Lorain Connector Project. In 2022, WPKND was able to secure \$750,000 through Cuyahoga County to help make this project a reality in the coming years.



Finally, our work engages the community and brings people together through events like The Hooley, a street festival that celebrates the neighborhood and showcases our Kamm's Corners businesses, KCFM, Pop-Ups in the Parks, and others. From June through October, every Sunday, the Kamm's Corners Farmers Market is the gathering spot to meet neighbors, enjoy live music, learn more about health, wellness, and sustainability, and — most importantly—get fresh produce and local foods from some of the best farms and small food businesses in the region.
